WASHINGTON, October 13.—In Philadel-

phia the Democrats claim the city by 6000

majority, and the Republicans claim it by

2000. Secret districts are in progress. The

Eleventh Ward gives 900 Democratic

majority, and gain of 124. Fifth Ward

gives a Republican majority of 235, a

Republican gain of 167. Westchester

borough, Chester county, gives 698

Republican majority, a Republican gain

of 85. Eleven districts of Chester

county give a Republican majority of 796,

showing a Republican gain of 102. Colum-

bia borough, Lancaster county, gives a

Republican majority of 111, Republican

gain of 53. Lancaster city gives a Demo-

cratic majority of 174, a Republican

gain of 159. Four districts of Delaware

county show a Republican gain 118. Tus-

carora county, gives a Republican

majority of 93, a Republican gain of 17. Al-

len, Lehigh county, three wards, give

a Republican majority of 175, a Repub-

lican gain of 67.

Later—in Centre county, nine districts

show a Democratic majority of 331; Re-

publican gain of 148. West Chester

borough, Democratic majority 300;

Republican gain 58.

Carbon county, Democratic majority 540;

Democratic gain 100.

Northampton county, Easton and eleven

districts, Democratic majority of 308; Re-

publican gain of 134.

Berks county—seven districts show a

Democratic majority of 6300; Democratic

gain 522.

In Philadelphia the Democrats elect the

Mayor and Council members by 1000 ma-

jority. Kelly, O'Neill and Myers are re-

lected to Congress, and Taylor probably.

Chester county—Republican majority

2100; Republican gain of 200.

Fulton county, Democratic majority 250;

of 20.

PHILADELPHIA, October 13.—Twelfth

Ward, Democratic majority 280; a Repub-

lican gain of 177. Seventeenth Ward, De-

of 56.

Mean gains all around. Estimated Repub-

lican majority in the State 25,000.

Indications are that Ohio goes Repub-

lican by at least 20,000 majority.

Ohio is defeated in the Second Ohio Dis-

trict.

SPAIN.

Extinction of Religious Corporations—

Close Relations with France.

MADRID, October 13.—The Junta is sure

of the extinction of all religious corpora-

tions. Internal taxes on home or foreign

wares have been abolished.

PARIS, October 13.—Prim has written the

Emperor stating that the Junta desires

close relations with France. They prefer

a royal will to be acceptable to France

and Europe.

The provinces of Barcelona and Valencia

being strongly protectionist, hesitate to

recognize the Junta.

The Junta has seized the property of the

Jesuits, and abolished the order.

HAVANA, October 13.—Lersundi has not

declared for the Provisional Government,

but will maintain law and order. He says

he is a loyal Spaniard and only retains and

governs the island as a portion of the

Spanish Dominion irrespective of parties

and the mother country. The is-

land is perfectly tranquil.

LONDON.

Relief of Earthquake Sufferers.

Ninety-First Day's Session.

TUESDAY, October 13, 1868.

The Senate was called to order by the

President at twelve o'clock M.

The roll was called, the following mem-

Prayer by the Chaplain, Rev. Mr. Turner.

On motion of Mr. Beares, the reading of

the minutes was dispensed with.

Mr. Lynch, from the Finance Committee,

reported unfavorably upon Senate bill No.

275, an act for the relief of the non-com-

missioned officers and privates of the Sixth

Louisiana Volunteer Infantry.

Mr. Darrall, from the Enrollment Com-

mittee, reported, as duly enrolled, Senate

bills Nos. 84, and as duly enrolled, Senate

bill No. 265, Senate joint resolution No. 39

and House bill No. 209, Senate bills Nos. 241,

87 and 224, Senate joint resolutions 25 and

33, and House joint resolution No. 224, and

House bill 293.

Mr. Campbell, from the Committee on

Corporations, reported favorably upon

Senate bill No. 218, an act to amend an act

entitled an act to incorporate the City of

Carrollton.

MOTIONS.

Mr. Todd: I move that Senate bill No. 218

be printed.

Adopted.

Mr. Campbell: I move that Mr. Randall be

granted leave of absence for twelve days.

Adopted.

Mr. Futch: I move to reconsider the

vote by which was finally passed Senate

bill No. 275, an act to appoint attorneys-

at-law from other States to practice in the

courts of this State.

Adopted.

On motion of Mr. Futch the bill was then

laid on the table subject to call.
