WASHINGTON. Confiscation Laws Constitutional—Grant Accepts Boston Hospitality—Revenue Frauds in Texas—Grant's Official Majority in California—Gold in the Treasury.

WASHINGTON, December 1.—Judge Chase has decided several confiscation cases, sustaining Judge Underwood's previous decision. The decisions involve the declaration that the confiscation laws are constitutional, and that there was no appearance and plea by the defendants, the admiralty side of the District Court had full jurisdiction to decree confiscation and sale.
