WASHINGTON, March 4.-Internal revenue receipts to date over \$500,000.

Colonel Charles Bunt, of the engineer corps, has been sentenced to a suspension of rank for three months.

James M. Mason (colored), of Arkansas, was nominated to-day as United States Consul General to Liberia.

The bill reported by Mr. Robertson, from the disabilities committee, does not relieve a person whose case is affected by the fourteenth amendment.

House-After some unimportant business the House was taken up to-day, and will be closed on to-morrow.

Mr. Butler, in urging the bill, said that Georgia for the first time presented herself in a proper guise.

When formally arraigned, and the clerk read the charges, he pleaded not guilty.

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FIREMEN'S ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION.

GRANDEST PAGEANT OF ALL.

Route of the Procession Thronged. The Fourth of March, 1870, the thirty-third anniversary of the New Orleans Fire Department, dawned most inauspiciously.

The thunder storm of the previous night had not cleared up the sky, and the heavy leaden-colored clouds hung in unbroken masses overhead, threatening at every moment to pour down their pent-up contents.

The column moved in four divisions. At the head of the first came the Grand Marshal, I. N. Marks, Esq.

The second company in line was Pelican No. 1, of Algiers, with their hand engine brightly and tastefully decorated.

The Pelicans were followed by their townsmen of Brooklyn No. 2. The engine was decorated with pink paper, artificial flowers, and a miniature canopy.

Washington Hook and Ladder, also of Algiers, and Protector No. 2, of Jefferson, closed the first division.

The second division was headed by Chief Engineer and the four Assistant Engineers.

The leading company was Milneburg No. 1, with their hand engine richly decorated with flowers.

Mississippi 2, with its unapproachable steamer, Lady Blessing, created a furor.

American Hook and Ladder, No. 2, headed by the band of the Christian Brothers' school, looked well in their blue shirts.

Columbia No. 5, was headed by the old band of the Washington Artillery.

Just before noon various rumors were diligently circulated through the streets by people who had nothing else to do.

As has been before stated, the final arrangement made with the several companies was that they were to start from their houses at one o'clock.

The first company of this division was Phoenix No. 8, headed by its exempt members.

Foreman William Swan headed Hoop Hook and Ladder No. 3. This company, with a history of which it is justly proud, met with universal admiration.

Creole No. 9 was not among the least of all the splendid gathering. Showers of flowers had been poured upon the company by lady friends.

Mechanics No. 7, of Mobile, were next in line. The company, in their striking uniform, formed a splendid spectacle.

At one o'clock the twelve strokes were again given on the bells, and the column was at once put in motion.

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ARREST OF EX-AUDITOR WICKLIFFE.

Alleged Embezzlement of \$500,000. HIS COMMITMENT TO PARISH PRISON.

Thursday, Mr. James Graham, Acting Recorder, made a formal affidavit before Recorder Becker, charging George W. Wickliffe, Ex-State Auditor, with the crime of embezzling State funds to the amount of \$500,000.

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THE ORDER OF THE DAY.

Although not carried out, at least as far as adherence to time was concerned, directed the assemblage of the companies on Canal street at 10 A. M.
