WASHINGTON, March 17.—Internal revenue

receipts to-day, \$156,000.

The Reconstruction Committee have

agreed to report a bill for Texas similar

to that of Mississippi.

The Texas Congressional delegation visited

the President to-day.

The Senate Committee on Commerce have

agreed to report a bill to amend the act

to establish ports of entry at various points

on the Ohio and Mississippi rivers.

The Senate confirmed the following named

persons to be Ministers resident: Charles

H. Lewis, of Virginia, to Portugal; Joseph

Russell Jones, of Illinois, to Belgium; C. G.

Adams, of Minnesota, to Stockholm; and

Robert C. Kirk, of Ohio, to Uruguay.

The Senate also confirmed W. H. Hardy

as Assessor of Internal Revenue, Third

District, Louisiana; John G. Kandle, Postmaster

at Oxford, Mississippi; John G. Blackwell,

Postmaster at Public Point, Huntsville,

Alabama; Charles C. Crowe, of Alabama,

Register of Land Office, Wyoming land

district.

The President to-day replied to a resolution

of the Senate, inclosing a communication

from the Secretary of State, who gives

the names of thirty States reported as

having ratified the fifteenth amendment, in-

cluding New York, Indiana, Texas and

Georgia.

He adds, "that he does not assume to en-

terprate the action of Congress in defining

the condition or relation of any State to the

Federal government." He merely presents a

list of the resolutions purporting to ratify

the proposed amendments, of which notice

has been given to the President by the

State, with the dates of their respective

adoption.

House—The House debated at length

to-day the bill for the funding bill, and

the Banking and Currency Committee, or the

Ways and Means Committee, and finally

voted to refer it to the latter.

Mr. Butler reported a bill for the admis-

sion of Texas, which is identical with

the bill reported by the Ways and Means

Committee, with the exception of an addi-

tional provision that the passage of this

bill shall not affect the condition and

relation of Texas as originally

admitted. In response to an additional pro-

vision offered by Mr. Wood, that the State

be admitted without qualification except as

stated in the bill, Mr. Butler said he had no

objection to it, and that he would

offer a substitute bill reciting that

Texas had a constitution which is republican

in form, and "he is, therefore, in favor of

School Directors here have ordered that no
