TRIAL OF THE PNEUMATIC CAR.—On the tenth instant, pursuant to notice, the pneumatic car made a daylight trial trip from the foundry at the corner of Peters and Erato streets.

A DOUBLE TRAGEDY.—The following narration of domestic infelicity is taken from the Bulletin. It is a short history, full of woe and sadness not often heard of.

Tuesday evening last, about seven o'clock, a encounter took place at Bay St. Louis between two residents of the village, well known in New Orleans, resulting in the immediate death of one, and in the other receiving a wound supposed, at last accounts, to be mortal.

The parties were Dr. Columbus Post, who formerly resided in this city, and Mr. Evans, a doctor, proprietor of the Bay St. Hotel, at the Bay. There had been ill blood between them for about a year, it is stated by persons acquainted with the circumstances, and it brought the tragedy about.

Both had families. Mr. Saucier was some fifty-five or sixty years of age, and his wife is the mother of adult children—of men and women. Dr. Post was about thirty or thirty-five years of age, and was accompanied by a friend, who was not far from ninety, was ill, and Mr. Saucier left the hotel, informing her husband that she was going to sit up with the old lady during the night.

Dr. Post and his friend proceeded to Dr. Post's apothecary shop and knocked. He came out, and telling them he was engaged, closed the door upon them. They remained in the street until about midnight, when they went out of the shop and return directly to the hotel.

A day or two after Mr. Saucier challenged Dr. Post to a duel, and was prevented from doing both, and their being placed under bonds to keep the peace. Subsequently, Mr. Saucier, either by letter or verbal communication, ordered the Doctor to go to his village, and announced to him that if he remained he did so at the peril of his life.

This matter stood for some weeks, both parties, seemingly, prepared for a deadly encounter, until Thursday evening, when Mr. Saucier was hovering about the establishment of Dr. Post, and remained until the Doctor came out and was walking the street, when Mr. Saucier fired upon him with a revolver. All five of the shots took effect and killed the Doctor on the spot.

ARREST OF MR. MUSHAWAY.—Another Phase of Scandalous State Warrants.—Yesterday, Mr. Mushaway, an elderly man, who was in the confidence of Mr. ex-Attorney Wickliffe, was arrested and locked up in the first precinct station, charged with a felony before and after the fact.

The complainant is Mr. Strauss, a money broker, who asserts that he has been victimized to the extent of nearly one hundred thousand dollars by fraudulent warrants which he purchased some time ago. The facts in the case have not become public, but there are rumors concerning the transaction which are very damaging to several parties. When arrested, Mr. Mushaway had fifteen thousand dollars on his person.

Last Saturday night Mr. Wickliffe, in a manner disguised, visited Mr. Strauss at his private residence, and there produced \$150,000 in State warrants, which he (Wickliffe) offered to sell at more than the market discount. Mr. Strauss agreed to purchase them, paying \$71,000 in cash and agreeing to give a check Monday morning for \$19,000 more.

On Monday morning Mr. Strauss ascertained that the warrants were fraudulent, when he immediately sought the services of Captain Schreiber to ferret out the transaction. The Captain was not long in arriving at a conclusion, keeping a close watch on Mr. Mushaway during the day.
