Mr. Emley, the Administrator of Commerce, introduced at an ordinance at the last meeting of the Council, looking to a radical change in the inspection of the measurement of the articles referred to.

As all six Recorders are men of capacity and excellent standing in society, citizens may rest assured that justice will be meted out to all speedily, and with as little ceremony as possible. Abuses have been quite thoroughly reformed, so that now people must expect proper treatment in these courts, and the most refined need not shudder at the thought of being called into them, either as prosecutors or witnesses.

This is an old excuse, and has been successfully played for years. Recently a healthy looking watchman was on duty on this plea, but when Dr. Cooper, police surgeon, visited the man's house, he found him quite well.
