CITY COUNCIL LAST NIGHT.

THE JACKSON RAILROAD BONDS. Reference to a special committee.

CONCERT SALOON'S MUSIC ALLOWED. Passage of new ordinances.

A special meeting of the Council was held at 7 P. M. A quorum not being present.

On motion of Mr. West, the reading of the minutes of the last meeting was dispensed with.

Mr. Walton presented the certificate of appointment of Hubert Bonzano, as Administrator of Assessment, vice McCarty.

The certificate was referred to a committee consisting of Administrators Emley and D-laszie, and having been reported as being in due form, the name of Hubert Bonzano was ordered to be entered on the roll.

Mr. Walton stated that if in order, he would remark in reference to his report at a previous meeting respecting a deficiency of \$300,000 in the city treasury.

President Flinders said that if permitted, he had a few remarks to make. The refusal to ratify this sale might result in the entire loss of that property to the city.

Sec. 5. Be it further ordained, etc., That no bonds to be issued by the city of New Orleans in pursuance and under authorization of section forty-one of the act of the Legislature...

Sec. 6. Be it further ordained, etc., That for the payment of bonds and the exchange, negotiation or sale thereof, and for performing all other duties, the Administrator of the Floating Debt shall receive as full compensation of services as well as for all expenses incurred, one-half of one percent of the face of the bonds negotiated and sold or paid out or sold, and no more.

Sec. 7. Be it further ordained, etc., That this ordinance shall be incorporated in the charter of the city of New Orleans, and the same shall bind itself to the city to set fully in accordance with the provisions of the act of the Legislature...

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today evening, at half-past five o'clock, before United States Commissioner D. U. Cooley, at his office, in the Customhouse.

Judge Cooley appeared and presented the case in person. He offered in evidence a printed volume of the Congressional report, containing the allegations in the affidavit.

Being sworn as a witness, Judge Cooley read from the printed volume the testimony of the effect that a lot of blank certificates of naturalization had been sent to the Bureau of Naturalization by the parish of Plaquemine, Louisiana, signed by William Cooley, judge of the Sixth District Court, and that he knew Judge Cooley well, and that the signatures were in his handwriting and were also signed by William Woelper.

Judge Cooley read and all these allegations were absolutely and unqualifiedly false; that he never had signed any such papers as Judge of the Sixth District Court or any other court; that he never had known some length of time, and has seen a great deal of his handwriting, I have to say that, previous to coming to this building to-day, I might, without knowing him, have seen Mr. Edgeworth very often, but since coming here this evening, I have not seen him since that time.

Since I have been on the bench of the Sixth District Court, I have been more or less conversant with all judicial functions, and from the fact that I knew I was closely watched by those who only watched an opportunity to impeach and remove me, and to get me out of the office, I have been very particular in my signature, and have not signed any such papers as Judge of the Sixth District Court, or any other court.

Cross-examination by Mr. Urban. Has not the habit of signing papers in blank a few days after I took my seat as Judge of the Sixth District Court, about the first of March, 1870, and since that time, I have not signed any such papers as Judge of the Sixth District Court, or any other court.
