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ON GARONDELET STREET. The noticeable thing yesterday upon the street was the rapid rise in Slaughterhouse stock. The bulls had it pretty much their own way, and a considerable amount changed hands. Wednesday evening a transaction was made at \$28 75. Yesterday morning \$29 was paid, and the price traveled up nearly four points during the day. We heard of the following sales before the meeting of the board: 200 shares at \$29, 100 at \$30, 100 at \$30 25, 100 at \$31, and 200 at \$32. At the session of the board offers and bids were plentiful, and several lots were disposed of at \$32 and \$32 25, though at the start \$35 was asked. After adjournment a sale was made of 590 shares, fifteen days, flat, at \$33. There was nothing new in Ship Island. One hundred shares changed hands at the board at \$1 57. Mississippi Valley Lumber Company seems to be in a pretty fair position. A sale of 500 shares was effected by one well-known operator at \$10 87, and we heard of another transaction at \$11.
