Sold Walls Thrown Down.

An explosion occurred at the Baton Rouge Arsenal last Friday. The Courier gives the following report of the catastrophe: At the sale of ordinance stores, a few weeks ago, large quantities of cartridges were sold, and several workmen have since been employed in putting them in a condition to be moved.

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THE FENIANS.
