LOCAL INTELLIGENCE.

RECORDEE WEBER'S COURT.—Robert Phillips, charged by George O. Beares with being accessory to the murder of James D. Beares, was remanded to await examination.

Bushrod Denny, charged with assault with a dangerous weapon and cutting with intent to kill, was remanded in default of bail to be examined.

Samuel Coalman, violating city ordinances, was committed to the Parish Prison for ten days in default of \$10 fine.

Louis Paddy, charged by Officer Dilling-crover with being a vagrant and street beggar, was sent to the City Workhouse.

James Connors, charged by Officer W. W. Jackson with being a vagrant, was also sent to the Workhouse for six months.

BEFORE RECORDEE MARSH.—Three out of five of the Italians who were arrested Monday night, charged as being accessories to the attempted assassination of Demichila, were released on bonds.

The principal in the affair, Joseph Inaldo, is now in the Charity Hospital under medical treatment from a stab in the right breast, inflicted by a stiletto. Demichila is locked up in the Third District, but positively refuses to give any information.

SECTION 1.
