Outlaws of Winn Parish RECORD OF THEIR BLOODY DEEDS

The following is reproduced in our columns from the Natchitoches Times. It is a fearful tale of the deeds of outlaws, which almost makes the reader shudder with horror.

We, the people of Winn Parish, Louisiana, feel it our duty to inform the public of the facts concerning the crime which occurred near Atlanta, on the twenty-fourth day of April, 1870.

It appears that they broke the ice by stealing thirty or forty bales of cotton near Wheeling, and proceeded to rob other citizens.

It is a short time after this, that a negro boy, because he was not willing to remain with old man Kimbrel, his former master.

Upon another occasion, two freedmen, who were travelling, were directed by the Kimbrel to John R. West, to stay all night.

Every attempt to have them tried and committed by civil law, proved ineffectual. John R. West said he intended to regulate his country.

We hope the time is not far distant when former peace and prosperity will be restored to our country. We are aware, however, that many of these desperadoes are yet in existence.

THE FRESH MEAT SUPPLY

CAVAROC SLAUGHTERHOUSE SUSPENDED SEIZURE OF MARKET CARTS

The action of the courts, restraining other parties than the Crescent City Live Stock and Slaughterhouse Company from the business of slaughtering and landing beef cattle, resulted, last evening, in the seizure of two carts loaded with beef, belonging to Mr. Stafford.

Between two and three hundred head of slaughtered beef are hanging up in the Cavaroc slaughterhouse, inexcusable laws and Captain Edgeworth of the Sanitary Police positively forbidding the removal of this beef to the markets.

Later reports are that ten beefs, valued at \$350, were seized by Captain Edgeworth, in the two carts of Mr. J. Stafford, of Fulton Market.

It is stated that Mr. Emley, the acting Mayor of the city, was called on by Mr. Stafford, and was informed by him that he did not wish to proceed to violent measures.
