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The Young Slave-Devil.

The St. Louis Republican of the 8th says: A gentleman, who was a passenger, states that when the train coming east arrived at Jefferson City yesterday, the inspector proceeded, as usual, to tap the car wheels to discover, when he discovered a boy under one of the cars, who had been stealing a ride from Kansas City. He had formed a sort of net of rope, in which he had suspended like a spider in his web, between the axle of one of the trucks and the floor of the car. The boy was routed out of his place, and quite a crowd gathered about him on the platform. He was disposed to be evasive, and said he had no favors to ask of anybody. He stated that he had ridden in this way thousands of miles. As the train was moving off slowly from Jefferson City, the boy got in his old place again under the car, while it was in motion. The conductor was notified, and stopped the train. The boy was hauled out from his lurking place, and, taking up a stone, was in the act of hurling it at the conductor, when the latter knocked him down. He did not "head head" it any further on that train.

We learn this from the Red River News: On Thursday morning, May 12, the bodies of two colored men, whose names we have been unable to ascertain, were found on the road, between Colored Simpson's place and Lorton's store, in the parish below Montgomery. On examination they had the appearance of having been strangled or hung, abrasions being observed around their necks. They had been working on Mr. Bell's place and had considerable money, having just been paid off. On searching nothing was found on their persons. The bodies were discovered by Joseph Gilyard and Robert Walker. The supposition is that they were murdered and then robbed. Who were the perpetrators of this terrible deed is unknown, yet retribution must inevitably follow those who commit such heinous crimes.

An inquest has been held in Iberville parish on the body of an unknown white woman, found drowned in the Mississippi river. She appeared to be German descent, about twenty-five years of age, with light blue eyes and light sandy hair. Had on a purple calico dress, and a brown calico undershirt, and a cotton handkerchief round her neck. In the pocket of the dress, tied up in a pocket handkerchief, was found the sum of six dollars and twenty-five cents in currency, an iron key, and a passenger ticket for a dock passage down the river on the steamer John Kilgour.
