Local Intelligence.

St. Charles Institute.—On Wednesday and Thursday the examinations of the pupils of the St. Charles Institute took place, Wednesday being devoted to the primary, and Thursday to the higher classes.

Without attempting a detailed account of the very interesting exercises, we may say that everything must have been highly satisfactory to the parents and friends of the pupils who were present. The exercises were conducted in English and French, and it is one of the excellencies of the St. Charles Institute, that while the English taught there has all the idiomatic ease and correctness of the higher scholastic institutions, the pupils have peculiar facilities for the acquisition of the French language.

An interesting part of the examination consisted of the recitations of original compositions, both in French and in English. Several of the pupils recited compositions in both languages, and were equally charming in either. Among others were two by Miss V. A., "Adventures of a Diamond" and "La Vie de Passion." Miss C. A. recited "Things that change" and "L'Amant est un Charmant Huisant."

After the literary examinations were concluded, the pupils gave numerous specimens of the musical proficiency acquired in the institute, and the performances were greatly to the credit of the professors connected therewith, Miss Landreau, Madame Mair, Mr. Delacroix and Madame Camier.

These persons would have, of course, to walk the streets & make their way to the outskirts, to be seen, were it not for the shelter afforded by these stations.

THE STOLEN CALD.—Rudy Glaze, who was arrested some days ago on suspicion of complicity with the abduction of Mr. Digby's child, was discharged, no evidence having been brought against her. Cora Lee, arrested by Officer Merrill on the same charge, has been set to the Parish Prison for safe keeping, in default of \$2500 bail.

AN INSTANCE OF N.G.O.—On Friday last an instance was made to come over Mr. B. T. Walsh, on Canal street, by a forged order made in the name of Keep & Hogan. The order, which called for a respectable outfit of gents' furnishing goods, would have been filled had it not been forgotten that the order was not to be filled.

The order was taken by a colored boy, and, of course, the adventurer who employed him was the watch, and seeing the failure of his little game, concluded to exercise his cme.

BASE BILL.—This afternoon a game of base ball will be played by the Pelicans and College nines, of Baton Rouge, at the corner of Bienville and Rocheblave streets. The game will commence at two o'clock.

The first of a series of games between the Washington and Atlantic clubs will take place at the Washington ground, foot of Clout street, Third District, this afternoon at three o'clock.

BURGLARY.—Friday night the residence of Mrs. Wardle, No. 232 Thalia street, was entered by thieves, who went through attornies like a dose of salts, particularly admired and appropriated the breastpin and encircling Leroy and Henry Cotton to commit the murder of Major J. B. Lochman, in this city, in January, 1869, and called the attention of the court to the fact that the names of the witnesses were not indorsed on the back of the indictment, as is customary. Read that portion of the transcript of the testimony taken at the Cotton trial relating to McLaughlin's action on the occasion of the murder. Witnesses were here introduced by the prisoner's counsel.

M. K. Canfield sworn.—Testified substantially as follows: Was in the city at the time Lochman was killed; the prisoner was also in the city, and remained for some time afterward; prisoner was not arrested here

on any charge relating to the murder; McLaughlin was present in the courtroom when Cotton was tried. Cross-examined by the State.—Prisoner made a confession of participating in the murder, but denied it; witness was present at the inquest held on the body of Lochman; [Here the witness made a lengthy statement in regard to McLaughlin's arrest and subsequent escape at New Orleans, which has already been printed in these columns.—Reporter.] The prisoner, from my knowledge, is a poor man.

Special Officer James Norton sworn.—Testified that he had been a resident of and a police officer in this city for three or four years; made arrests after the killing of Lochman; did not arrest McLaughlin; there was no charge against him; the prisoner remained here some time after the killing, and was present at the Cotton trial.

Here McLaughlin's counsel rested. Major Thomas Smith sworn.—Testified substantially as follows: Witness was shown a slip of paper with writing on it; recognized it as a telegram signed by himself and addressed to George Davis, by witness in his capacity as chief of police of Galveston. [State here desired to read the telegram alluded to, but objections were raised, and the telegram was not read.—Reporter.] I had a copy of the telegram alluded to in the killing of Lochman, in the city of New Orleans, in May, 1869, for I do not know how long after the killing, for I was not in Texas at the time; I was in New Orleans on government business, at the United States detective at the time, and attached to headquarters Fifth Military District; I met McLaughlin in New Orleans, he asked me about Texas, and about Lochman's murder, and when I told him nothing about it, as I was not in Texas at the time.

The prisoner went on to explain the character of the men, and the impression left on my mind at the time I sent the telegram alluded to. McLaughlin is, as follows: In speaking of the murderer, the prisoner said he was with the parties; they went to the house; that he (McLaughlin) thought Cotton was a "blower," and when they were in the house, and Lochman came in, he (the prisoner) said words to the effect that if he was going to do anything, now is the time. Leroy Cotton rose from the chair; Henry Cotton following. Leroy Cotton, who was Lochman, pistol in hand, and asked him to retract. Lochman refused. Leroy Cotton laid one hand on him and with the other discharged the pistol, Lochman clenched his teeth, and fell together on the floor. Lochman slightly on his side and Leroy Cotton a little under him. While in that position Henry discharged the deringer in Lochman's side, and he fell on his back. Lochman refused to retract. The telegram alluded to was sent after I assumed the position of chief of police in this city.

Here the evidence closed, and the argument was made by the State, by Colonel Thomas M. Jack, for McLaughlin, who was followed by Mr. Stuart and Granville H. Sherwood, Esq., for the State. Colonel Jack, in behalf of his client, Lochman, made a strong argument. After the conclusion of the argument, the court decided that the prisoner should be admitted to bail, and fixed the amount at \$3000.

From what we can understand, the "reason why" the names of no witnesses appear on the back of the indictment is that the indictment was mainly brought upon the statement of Leroy Cotton, who was the county jail previously to his suicide. This we have from a member of the grand jury that found a "true bill" against McLaughlin.

The telegram alluded to in the testimony of Major Smith is as follows:

OFFICER CHIEF OF POLICE, Galveston, Texas, April 5, 1870.

Governor E. J. Davis: Sir, as I can recollect, the following statement was made to me by William McLaughlin, alias Shang McLaughlin, in May last, at New Orleans, that he (McLaughlin), was the companion of the parties in question, and went to the house of Maggie Mitchell; sat down in the parlor; heard Lochman's voice in the adjoining room; Shang remarked to Leroy, "there is an axe in the closet; go and get it; do it." Leroy walked into the other room and met Lochman; asked him to retract what he had said; Lochman replied that he would not; Leroy then pulled a pistol and discharged it; Lochman fell; Lochman then clenched him and threw him on floor; the coin stepped up and shot him in the side with a derringer pistol. Shang also says, if it had not been for the fact that he would have got the better of Leroy. McLaughlin said that sooner than he is a witness, he left Galveston, as he considered it a cold-blooded murder. I make this statement at the request of Frank Cotton, brother of Leroy. (Signed) THOMAS SMITH, Chief of Police.

Able and eloquent addresses were also delivered by Dr. Thomas D. Worrell, J. A. Walsh, Esq., Captain D. C. Woodruff & G. F. Fisk, Esq. The speakers each received a hearty vote of thanks at the conclusion of their remarks.

Captain William George was elected an honorary member of the club. After which the club adjourned to meet next Wednesday night.

After the reception of new members and the report of the committees, a communication from the First German Republican Club, Fourth District, accompanied with preamble and resolutions, including the thanks, etc., of their club to Administrators West, Emley and Bozano, was received and unanimously adopted.

JUVENILE DEEL.—Commercial Alley is becoming famous as a fighting ground. If matters go on the alley, instead of being styled "Commercial" (commerce means peace) will merit some such appellation as "Boulevard de Batailles." A few days ago a grand combat a la rooster was noted. Here is the record of another battle a la rooster. The combatants, one an incipient barber, the other an incipient shoemaker, got into an argument, the one with a stick, the other with a pitcher. The pitcher proved the stronger, for the snickling toner applied it to the head of the nascent Crispin with such force that both pitcher and head gave way, and it became difficult to decide which was the most broken. The head was consigned to the recuperative power of the Esculapian art; but for the pitcher, as the tombstone says, "physicians were in vain."

RECORDED WEBER'S COURT.—John Carl, charged by Officer Backers with violating ordinances 638 and 641, paid ten dollars.

August Kester went to the Parish Prison in default of five dollar's fine for violating city ordinance 611.

Charles Nelson, charged with violating city ordinances, was discharged.

James McCourt, who stole three hats and three walking canes from the hat rack in the house of Dr. H. F. Wade, corner of Jackson and Magazine streets, on the twenty-third of June, was up. One of the witnesses against McCourt is the man, James Donovan, who was with him when he stole the effects, and who is already before the District Court in the case. As Donovan was descending the witness stand, McCourt being indignant at being betrayed by his confederate in crime, struck him, and would have done him some injury but for the court officers. He was put in irons and the examination continued. He has gone before the First District Court. A case is pending against him there already for burglary. He stands a good chance of going to Baton Rouge on both charges.

Hugh Magdon, for threatening to "whip" his "big brother," furnished bail not to do it.

Joseph Koch, for violating city ordinance 1641, was fined ten dollars or ten days in the Parish Prison.

IN THE PARISH OF ORLEANS, delegates to the said convention shall be elected from the Representatives of the Parish of Orleans, in accordance with the above basis.
