

LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES.

Passed at the Second Session of the Forty-First Congress.

(Public Law 186.)

AN ACT making appropriations for the support of the army for the year ending June thirty, eighteen hundred and seventy-one, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That all the moneys in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the support of the army for the year ending June thirty, eighteen hundred and seventy-one...

For subsistence in kind for regular troops and employes, four million thirteen thousand nine hundred and seventy-seven dollars and twenty-two cents.

For medical and other necessary works for the library of Surgeon General's office, three thousand dollars.

For the general and incidental expenses of the Quartermaster's department, consisting of postage, printing, and other expenses received and sent by officers of the army on public service...

For transportation of the army, including baggage of the troops when moving either by land or water, clothing, camp, and transportation equipment from the arsenal at Philadelphia, Cincinnati, and New York to the several posts and army depots...

For the purchase of land, and for the purchase and repair of wagons, carts, and drays, and of ships and other sea-going vessels, and boats required for the transportation of supplies and for garrison purposes...

For establishing and maintaining national cemeteries, three hundred thousand dollars; provided, that twenty thousand dollars of this amount be expended in planting and cultivating trees and shrubs in the several cemeteries...

nothing in this act shall be construed to prevent the assignment to duty, as additional second lieutenant, of the graduates of the Military Academy...

Sec. 25. And be it further enacted, That every private soldier and other who has served in the army of the United States during the rebellion, for ninety days, and remained loyal to the government...

Sec. 26. And be it further enacted, That the Secretary of War shall be authorized to employ, for the purpose of this act, any number of officers of the army...

AN ACT to relinquish the interest of the United States in certain lands in the city and county of San Francisco.
