THE INDIA RUBBER MOTOR.

THE NEW CAR PROPULSION EXPERIMENT WITH A MODEL.

Fifty years ago the use of India rubber in Europe and America was confined to little else than to erase lead pencil marks on paper, and it did not even do that thoroughly.

One afternoon last week the working model of a car, to be propelled by the application of the contractile power of India rubber, was exhibited at the office of the Ship Island Canal Company.

There is a strong platform, on which the car is to rest, and to this platform is attached the car, by means of a complicated combination of cog and wheels which, when acted upon by the elastic power of India rubber, moves the car with steady motion.

In front, beneath the platform, there is a large wheel, called in the specifications of the patent the power pulley, among mechanics known as the master wheel. It acts like a drum, and the India rubber bands are fastened on the under part of the platform.

The bands of India rubber to be used in propelling the car, are made of a single round in diameter. For the benefit of juvenile readers, we may say here, the vulcanized India rubber means India rubber mixed with sulphur, and the India rubber means the pure rubber from being affected by heat.

The propelling machinery of the car is provided with a means of reversing its motion, and the car can be pulled up or down the foot; by this means, the car can be made to run backward as well as forward with equal facility.

And when the reliability of the invention is once fixed, the immense advantages to the public are obvious, and they will occur to the most unthinking.

The first cost is all. Giving a reasonable margin, even the machinery for propelling first-class city railroads will cost but few hundred and fifty dollars.
