WASHINGTON.

Nearly a Million Revenue Receipts—Thirteen and a Half Millions Debt Decrease—Coin and Currency in the Treasury—Receipts of Customs for a Week.

WASHINGTON, September 1.—Internal revenue receipts to-day nearly \$1,000,000. The debt statement shows a decrease of \$13,500,000. Coin in the treasury \$102,500,000; currency over \$37,000,000. Receipts of customs for the week ending the twenty-seventh instant, \$4,250,000.

LONDON.

Napoleon's Order to McMahon Disobeyed—French Raid Across the Rhine—The War in Prussia—Captures by a French Frigate—The French Bally Beaten on the Sedan Road—Parisian Fighting All Day Wednesday—Prussian Armies Moving.

LONDON, September 1.—It is said that McMahon disobeyed Napoleon's order to detach 30,000 soldiers to protect the Prince Imperial. A large body of the French Garde Mobile crossed the Rhine near Billenon, twenty miles from Metz, on the morning of Wednesday, and then retired. The Prussians have taken precautions to guard against such an enterprise hereafter.

The war cost Prussia ten and a half million francs daily. The French frigate off Plymouth, after capturing the Italian steamer, was seen late Wednesday afternoon in pursuit of a large German steamer, which was making every effort to escape.

The Standard's special, dated Florenville, Belgium, Thursday morning, says: "The French have just been badly beaten on the Sedan road. The Prussians have entered Carignan, a few miles south of Sedan. The French were fighting all day Wednesday between Armentières and Douai."

Paris is again accessible from this city via Metz. On Wednesday the Grand Duke of Mecklenburg Schwerin, was at Vouziers with his army. The Crown Prince of Saxony passed the town of Metz on Wednesday morning, and then retired. The Prussians have taken precautions to guard against such an enterprise hereafter.

General Von Falkenstein is already at Remagen, on the railroad between Forbach and Tuller. The French have just been badly beaten on the Sedan road. The Prussians have entered Carignan, a few miles south of Sedan. The French were fighting all day Wednesday between Armentières and Douai.

Social disorganization extends every where. Social and property are considered sources of trouble, and are objects of popular wrath. The ship Golden Rule, from New Orleans, July 7, for Bremen, put into Terrel, Holland, for medical reasons. Pallikau asks quarters in Paris for one hundred thousand Mobile Gardes, who have been called from the country to defend the city. Gratuities offered are expected from the proprietors of large establishments.

A telegram from Washington, D. C., has allayed all apprehensions of the "millibar movement," which has recently created some excitement. Impartial correspondence from Paris represents that terrorism is epidemic in the rural districts of France. Men of democratic ideas are persecuted as sympathizers with the enemy. The Prussians, wherever advancing, require the people to surrender their arms, and to open their houses and cellars to their windows uncurtained and their shutters opened. The Germans speak well of the roads over which they marched, for being in perfect order.
