Next Down for Trial.—Recorder Houghton yesterday sent the following cases to the Criminal Court for trial: Simon Woodbeck, for fraud. Charles Reynolds, for larceny. Joseph Featally, for feloniously entering a dwelling on Dryades street, near Mechanics' Institute. James Monroe, the old man charged with ravishing his step-daughter, on complaint of his wife, was permitted to go on peace bonds, as the great accusation was not made good by the prosecutor.

Virginia Jackson and Ann Thompson, charged with larceny, were remanded to prison. Two copies of prostitutes from the back part of the First District, for violating a city ordinance, were permitted to depart on payment of proper fines.
