MISCELLANEOUS. Republican Congressional Nominations in Virginia—Lumber Laden Schooner Abandoned—Georgia Democratic State Committee—Fall of an Editor.

REPUBLICAN PLATFORM. The Republican State Convention of Louisiana, which assembled in the city of New Orleans on the eighth of August, 1870, adopted the following declaration of principles:

1. That we indorse the principles of the national Republican party as set forth in the Chicago platform of 1868, and in the adoption of the fifteenth constitutional amendment and laws to enforce the same.

2. That we indorse the principle of equal rights to all mankind, whether at the ballot box, in the public schools or in the pursuit of business, without distinction of caste, race or nationality; and we pledge ourselves to the enactment and enforcement of laws to carry out this principle.

3. That no government is republican unless its citizens can exercise the free right of suffrage; and we pledge ourselves to the strength of the Republican party of this State to aid the executive officers in securing to every voter his inalienable right to cast his ballot at the polls for such candidates as he may prefer.

4. That method and not money make the true citizen; that the poor man should be protected equally with the wealthy, and that no man should be subjected to the punishment of a liberal homestead exemption law.

5. That we are a party of law and order, and as such we use our earnest endeavors to carry out the literal intent of the constitution, and we pledge ourselves to the maintenance of the constitution, and to the protection of the rights of our citizens, and to the maintenance and enforcement of the provisions of every law sitting forth to obtain national aid for the rebuilding of the levees, and the construction of railroads, and the opening of our harbors, and that we pledge them our support in similar labors in the future.

6. That we invite all citizens who believe in the elevation of mankind, in the principles of universal liberty, equality and justice, in the suppression of lawlessness and crime, in the maintenance of law and order, in an economical administration of government, in the elevation of honest and capable men to office, to join with us in the support of our party.

7. That we heartily approve of the action of our Senators and Representatives in Congress in the efforts they are putting forth to obtain national aid for the rebuilding of the levees, and the construction of railroads, and the opening of our harbors, and that we pledge them our support in similar labors in the future.

8. That we will sustain and support the President of this State, and all of their subordinates, in all efforts they may make to protect the lives, property and liberty of our citizens, in an honest and economical administration of the affairs of government, and in the maintenance and enforcement of the provisions of every law sitting forth to obtain national aid for the rebuilding of the levees, and the construction of railroads, and the opening of our harbors, and that we pledge them our support in similar labors in the future.

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11. That we pledge the support of the Republican party of the State to the nomination of a man, who will use all the honorable means to secure their election.

attacked the heights of Ville Juff. The battle began at three o'clock in the morning. After sustaining a sharp fire from the Prussians for some time, our troops carried the redoubt of Manling, Sagen, Ville Juff and Hancie Bruyere, and we occupy them. The Garde Mobile behaved well; the enemy's loss was great.

On the same day the French made a reconnaissance from the camp near the village of Dronicy, and a force from St. Denis at the same time attacked Pierre Fite, which the Prussians had occupied in considerable force. The French troops retreated to Dronicy unharmed.

BERLIN, September 27.—Captain Johnson, a bearer of dispatches to the British government, was roughly handled by the Prussians near Paris. He had subsequently been roughly handled by the French, under the impression that being an Englishman he must be a spy.

The Official Gazette says: Whatever may be the German plan regarding the government, the restoration of the Bonapartes is not among them.

FEARLESS, September 27.—King William apparently intends retaining his headquarters here. He has made every preparation for a long stay in this city.

DEVIL, September 27.—The completion of the Central Pacific Railroad hence to Golden City was celebrated yesterday. A breach broad enough to warrant an assault has been made in the wall of Strasburg.

The Washington correspondent of the St. Louis Republic telegraphs that the moment the President returns to Washington an attempt will be made to have him create a change in the Cabinet. Secretary Cox is the party against whom the fire of the Radical politicians is directed, and the charge is that he does not accord with the anxieties of the Republican Congressional Committee.

Simon Cameron is expected to be here to make a last appeal for Pennsylvania. The friends of Governor Cox declare that he will remain in the Cabinet during the entire administration of General Grant, unless he himself expresses a desire to be relieved.

Prussia's Preparations for War. A very intelligent correspondent writes to the New York Post that since the termination of the Prussian war, the Prussian Government has been constructing in Prussia or any of its dependencies—Saxony, Bavaria or Baden—in which the primary idea of its construction has not been military capacity and adaptation, rather than the means of merchandise traffic, and on every such car to-day in use in Prussia Germany may be distinctly marked the capacity of the same for so many men or many horses, as well as for military equipment and munition, as affecting all those liable to perform military duty, but not in actual service, was also so perfect that the men fell as it were into the hands of the Prussian Government, and the Prussian Government reached the district or town commanders, through the medium of the telegraph. In one small town of 5000 inhabitants, a conscription of 1000 men was made, and the field came, we were further informed, at night, after a majority of the inhabitants had retired to rest, and yet before noon of the next day the whole of the conscription was assembled, uniformed, organized with sub-officers, and were far on their way on the cars to the regimental or division rendezvous.

The editor of the New Iberia Times says: After spending half a day at Brashear we finally left for New Orleans in the one o'clock train, and along the route saw no case that would favorably compare with that of the other cities we saw on our way. Rice harvesting is now going on, and judging from the number and size of the fields, the yield in the Lafourche parishes must be very large.

Sixteen miles from New Orleans we met the graded portion of the Chattanooga Railroad, which is all ready to receive the ties that far up, the grade appears to be as high as that of the other parishes. As the two roads will run side by side many miles, in the future we may expect to hear of exciting locomotive races.

The New York Express, taking the wild statements of some of our city press as truth, says: Law is administered rather cursorily in New Orleans. A police officer caught a negro in the act of kidnapping a white child. The negro was taken before a magistrate. He did not deny the offense, but the magistrate let him go because of previous good character.

There was no attempt, in the case referred to, to kidnap the child. A colored man, known as a preacher of the gospel, saw a beautiful child as he was walking along the streets, and stopped a moment to caress it. And that is all there was of kidnapping.
