OFFICIAL. LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES. Passed at the Second Session of the Forty-first Congress.

AN Act making appropriations for the legislative, executive, and judicial expenses of the government for the year ending the thirtieth of June, eighteen hundred and seventy-one.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the following sums be, and the same are hereby appropriated (except otherwise herein provided), out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated...
