Local Intelligence.

DAILY MORTUARY REPORT.—Dr. S. C. Russell, Secretary of the Board of Health, reports that the whole number of deaths in this city for the twenty-four hours ending at six o'clock Monday evening was 28. Three died of consumption, 1 of chronic dysentery, 1 of bilious fever, 1 of pernicious fever, 2 of remittent fever, 13 of yellow fever, 1 of enlargement of the heart, 1 of scrofula, 1 premature birth.

CRIMINAL COURT.—George Ford, charged with larceny, was found guilty, but recommended to the mercy of the court. John Freeman was charged by Officer Pascal with larceny, and convicted. He was a levee thief. The property retained in the case of Sophia Zimmerman, lately acquitted from a charge of larceny preferred against her by J. Benton, was ordered to be divided, as by written agreement filed in the court.

THE FRAUDULENT TAX COLLECTOR.—During the early part of September State Auditor James Graham was informed that a young man named Charles B. Evans was collecting State taxes from property owners of the parish of St. Tammany. Evans was watched, and soon proof was obtained that he had obtained money from the following parties: A. A. McElmire, \$10 25; widow Joannin, \$23 50 and \$0 50; C. Millandou, \$20 50; J. H. Massie, \$14 on account. A second proof was obtained, which have been secured and filed in evidence against him. Most of the above-named parties appeared and testified in the case yesterday before Recorder Houghton, who committed the prisoner for trial before the Criminal Court.

TEMPERANCE CELEBRATION.—Two of the temperance organizations of New Orleans, Police Division No. 1, and Crystal Fountain No. 4, will have a public installation of the officers elected for the ensuing quarter at the Bible House, No. 163 Camp street, this evening. The ceremonies will commence at half-past seven o'clock, and will be rendered more impressive by appropriate music. The public in general, temperance folks or otherwise, are invited to attend.

AN UNGALLANT BROKER.—Two young ladies, members of the Gaito Troupe, who were promoting St. Charles street last evening, were pursued and grossly insulted by a man named Shoultice, who seemed to have a pretty fair load of benzine in his head and heels. They endeavored to avoid him, and when they arrived near the first precinct stationhouse, stepped in and asked for protection. Police Commissioner Robinson happened to be the first gentleman they met, and, of course, beauty or innocence never appeared to him in vain. On the simple complaint this official collared the offender and rushed him into a cell, the fair ones making a charge. Such instances of insolence to the weaker sex are uncommon in this city, and in former times were instantly punished by close applications of solo leather.

HUNTING DOWN OBSTRUCTIONISTS.—Officer Wick Ward is chasing up people who violate the ordinance relative to street and banquette obstructions in the First District. In many instances due notice to offenders. In many instances no attention was paid to the notification, therefore the officer yesterday filed a score of affidavits against business firms in the central portion of the First District.

AN INDIAN MEETING.—Several days ago, a sailor named Charles Mitchell was drowned off the ship Ulian; Monday evening the body was recovered off the head of Jackson street, the coroner was notified and an inquest held, but through the grievous fault of some one, the corpse was not removed for burial until dark last evening. All day long, citizens in that section made complaints to the police, and Captain Boyd Robinson grew excited over the neglect. He made several efforts to secure a burial. Mr. Long, coroner Roche's deputy, informed us that the blame rests on the under-

taker, who totally failed to attend to his business. A messenger was sent to another undertaker, who also failed to respond, but the third effort was successful, although it took a long time to execute the order as a coffin had to be made first. Last evening, many citizens living in the section mentioned, held an indignation meeting at the head of Jackson street, as they felt outraged at such lack of duty on the part of the coroner or the undertaker. We heard that the coroner was justly censured.

ALMOST A FIRE.—Just before nine o'clock last evening the bells sounded an alarm for the Fifth District, caused by a mosquito bar blazing in the boarding house of Mrs. Adams, No. 153 St. Charles street. One of boarders while lying in bed, accidentally placed a light too close to the bed, communicating a flame to the bar. In two minutes, more or less, a thousand firmen were on hand ready to flood the fire, but their services were not required.

AN ASSEMBLY.—In the report of the fanny meeting at the iron building Monday evening, it was stated that one of the speakers, Judge Childress, addressed the assembly with gentlemanly propriety. It should have been added that the speaker admitted that there were good and honest men in the Republican party, and spoke of the present city administration with approval. However, as a man must be who says that a country where there are no flags but the stars and stripes, is no country for him.

ONLY AN AGED FENCE POST.—It is queer how histories can be manufactured and recorded. An old cedar fence post, taken into an office to be used for a small purpose, was said, perhaps in jest, to have been a portion of a foundation in water for a great many years. The statement was taken up and cited as proof that cedar can endure more water than whiskey.

THEY HURT AN ST. CHARLES STREET.—Nobody HURT.—If a man wishes to raise a mass meeting without advertising, or giving much previous notice, let him fire a pistol in St. Charles street, at any point between Poydras street and Clay statue. On the instant some of the most desperate men, and some of the best in this country, will spring from somewhere, stork full of interrogation points, as was the case yesterday, at three o'clock. A gentleman walked leisurely down the street until he arrived opposite the lottery office, where he met a young man. After a few words, the first mentioned party sent a bullet in the direction of his antagonist, close enough to miss. The smoke had not cleared off before two policemen were masters of the situation, and they did the job neatly as well as quickly, taking the pistol and the shooter off to prison. During the scuffle the weapon was again discharged, but the bullet went to parts unknown. The target disappeared, smiling, though speechless. The assailant, who was released to appear again, would not explain the reason for firing, and the matter remains a mystery.

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ROBERT VEST, colored, charged with assaulting, on Sunday, August 21, Lovinia Pierce with a knife. While the jury came down with their verdict, they found Robert Vest already upon another charge of enticing a colored woman, Ellen Williams. The verdict was therefore not given before the second case was decided. He was convicted of both charges.

Henry Petrie, the man who succeeded in making his escape from the First District Recorder's Court last week, was captured last evening, and now plagues his mind as to how he will waltz off again.

ADOLPHE STEVENSON, fifty years old, was yesterday crushed to death in a mill, corner of Toulouse and Tremé streets. By an unfortunate motion he was caught in the belt, killing him almost instantly.

A FEW NIGHTS ago the residence of Mr. Paken, corner of Euterpe and Rampart streets, was robbed of some valuable articles. Captain Gibney, last evening, recovered nearly everything stolen and returned it to its owner.

THE NEW STEAMBOAT Iberia. The New Iberia Times thus mentions this new steamboat: The Atlantic Mail Transportation Company's new boat, the "Iberia," which left Louisville, Kentucky, on the seventeenth instant, reached our wharf on Tuesday night last, having come directly from Louisville to this point. She brought such a large amount of machinery, castings and other freight that she had to tow a barge in order to get out of the Ohio river, which is very low. The vessel, and her cargo, were in perfect condition, and we are satisfied that she is decidedly the best for the trade that has been in the Teche for years. She is in every particular a superior passenger boat. On the Teche, and in the bayou, she is so comfortable and convenient, that we are able to say truthfully, for the traveling public have suffered much on the bayou in times passed. It is claimed that the Iberia will be the last vessel in proper trim, and judging from her appearance, we should think she would. We learn she will take her place regularly in the trade after Sunday for Coconer by advertisement.

Pointe Coupee, October 1, 1870. The Parish Convention met on the first of October, 1870, at the residence of A. Bonhomme, and was presided over by the Rev. J. J. Dugas. A. Bonhomme was declared the nominee of the convention for Parish Judge. Hon. Emile Honore having received the highest number of votes, was declared the nominee of the convention for Sheriff. The convention then proceeded to the election of two candidates for the House of Representatives, and agreed that the two candidates receive the highest number of votes should be the nominees. Hon. H. C. Tomour and Mr. Stepany Hammond having received a majority of the votes cast, were declared the nominees of the convention. A large number of the citizens of Pointe Coupee were present, not less than five hundred. Each ward was duly represented in the convention. The Rev. J. J. Dugas presided throughout the entire day. Speeches were made by Hon. B. L. Lynch, Judge Alcide Bonhomme, Dr. R. T. Creamer, P. Thomas Dugas, and others. Resolutions were passed, endorsing our worthy chief executive, His Excellency, H. C. Warmoth, and pledging to him our undivided support in his strenuous effort to promote the interests of the State. The convention adjourned at twelve o'clock.

Parish of Terrebonne, October 1, 1870. The Republican Nominating Convention of the parish of Terrebonne was called to order at twelve o'clock, A. M., by Hon. P. O'Hara, president of the parish Executive Committee. P. O'Hara was elected president pro tem, and James L. Belden, secretary pro tem. An motion of T. A. Cagg, a committee of seven on credentials was appointed by the chair, being composed of T. A. Cagg, F. Marie, General Lyons, W. H. Keys, A. Verret, James Redman and Jordan Furtie. Credentials was made, received and adopted. Mr. A. Verret offered the following resolutions, which were adopted on a call for the yeas and nays.

Resolved, that this convention, representing all and every member pledges himself to support the regular nominees of our party, and to use all honorable means to secure their election. Resolved, further, that we recognize the regular nominees of the State Convention, Hon. L. A. Sibley, for Governor, Hon. James Graham for Auditor, Hon. A. Dubucq for Treasurer, and H. L. Sworis for Senator from the Eighth Senatorial District. Resolved, further, that in union there is strength and an impregnable barrier against defeat, and in disunion, party weakness, making it an easy prey to its ever-watchful enemies. It is the duty of the only known political disunion in our ranks in this section of the State, and in order that we may present the same undivided front to our opponents, the committee on credentials of this convention appoint a committee of five members to wait upon Hon. D. H. Reese and request him, in the name of the Republican party of the parish of Terrebonne, to accept of the nomination of the present canvass for Senator, as his present action impairs our party strength in the eyes of the people, and gives encouragement to our opponents. Believing that a sacrifice for his country and party in case of actual necessity, and confident in the reasonable appeal we now make to his judgment as a patriot and philanthropist, professing so much consideration, and heretofore espousing so warmly the cause of human rights, he is the last man now to throw stumbling blocks in their way, or the cause of Republican disunion. Wilkinson, T. Welch, B. Johnson, A. Riley, T. Brown, J. Leblanc, John Smith, C. Allen, N. Russell, J. White, James L. Belden, A. Yaver, John Cook. D. H. Reese was then introduced, and in reply to the request of the committee, stated that he would not withdraw his name from the canvass for Senator. On motion of T. A. Cagg, the convention went into nominations for members of the House of Representatives.

On motion of J. L. Belden, F. Marie was nominated by acclamation, there being no one opposing. For the other candidate, C. A. Verret, W. H. Keys, J. W. Wesley, James Redman, General Lyons and J. Furtie were put in nomination. After several ballots, C. A. Verret received a majority of votes and was declared nominated.

On motion the convention went into nominations for Parish Judge. A. Johnston, Paul Guidry and R. B. Lane were put in nomination. On motion, duly seconded, the nominations were closed, and the third ballot for the yeas and nays was cast; Paul Guidry having received twenty-seven votes, was declared the nominee of the convention for Parish Judge. On motion, duly seconded, the convention went into nominations for Sheriff. J. Furtie, W. H. Keys, A. Stroviak, W. D. V. Downing and A. Johnston were put in nomination. On the third ballot, W. H. Keys received forty votes and was declared the nominee of the convention for Sheriff. On motion, W. D. V. Downing was nominated for Coroner by acclamation.
