Resolutions and New Ordinances. Mr. Walton presented the following ordinance which was laid over:

Be it ordained by the Council of the city of New Orleans, That the ordinance reported in article 203, page 85, of Leovy and Luseburg's Digest of City Laws and Ordinances, be and the same is hereby amended and re-enacted so that section one shall read as follows:

The chimneys of all furnaces connected with steam engines used in factories of every description, and other establishments, shall be constructed at least twenty feet above the highest building within an area of one hundred (100) feet from the said factory, etc., and shall have caps on them so constructed as to prevent chimneys and roof from falling on the neighboring houses.

Be it further ordained, etc., That the owners or lessees of said factories, etc., shall take all proper precautions to prevent the chimneys and roof from becoming a nuisance to the neighbors.

By Mr. Bonzano. Resolved, That the Administrator of Public Accounts be and is hereby authorized to warrant on the Administrator of Finance in the sum of \$100,000, to be paid in three installments of thirty-three thousand three hundred and thirty-three dollars and twelve cents (\$33,333 1/3), said amount having been paid into the treasury in consequence of an erroneous assessment for the year 1869, and in full of the same, as President of the Union Bank of this city, in lieu of the actual amount received by him of three thousand dollars.

By Mr. Shaw. The undersigned, to whom was referred the bill of M. A. Southworth, Recorder of Mortgages, respectfully reports— The bill is for \$8211 for recording 2377 acts of mortgages, and for the same amount of charges for ordinary inscriptions, and the charge is doubled for those of unusual length.

This work is done in accordance with article 123 of the State constitution, and acts 95 of 1869 and 75 of 1870, passed in accordance therewith. The inscriptions embrace minors' mortgages and privileges and descriptions generally of the property of successions.

They are so inscribed because they are mortgages. The fee bill for the office of Recorder of Mortgages allows him one dollar and a half for each inscription. Technically, he could be limited to that; but we have found some of the inscriptions so long as to justify an equitable additional compensation. We report in favor of paying \$500 for 2377 inscriptions at \$1.50—\$3,565.50 Additional for long inscriptions— 500 00

Total—\$4,065.50 We recommend the adoption of the enclosed ordinance. JOHN S. WALTON, Administrator of Finance.
