The Prussians have been driven out of all the positions which they had occupied for three weeks. Toward St. Denis they have been driven away beyond St. Denis, St. Denis and Dagny. On the east side Joinville, Creteil, Chagny, Brigny, and the plateau of Auron have been recaptured. They have been forced from LeBas, Meudon and St. Cloud, and thrown back on Versailles. The enemy know now what a people can do who are determined to save their institutions and their honor. I invite the provinces to do their duty as Paris has done. Vive Paris! Vive la France! Vive la Republique!

Tours, October 14.—The General commanding the fifteenth corps makes the following report: La Touraine, St. Aubin, October 13.—Yesterday the enemy continued to advance toward Orleans. Our troops, who were on the road to Paris, and who had taken part the day before in the battle of Arsonne, gave way. A brigade of the third division, which tried to oppose the enemy's advance, being constantly opposed by forces more numerous, and a large number of our men fell back on Orleans, disputing the ground foot by foot. I was obliged in order to check the enemy's progress to go forward personally with three battalions of reserve belonging to the second division. The enemy had been checked for three hours, but at last we were broken and overcome by their shells. After very sharp fighting, which does honor to our army, I determined to retreat. Orders were given to withdraw to the left bank of the Loire. The retreat was effected in good order.

LONDON, October 14.—The following from Tours, was received here to-day, dated Wednesday evening. The Rouen Journal has an editorial demanding that the town be placed in a state of siege, and the command entrusted to an experienced general. All lines of communication to the west from Tours are still open. The Prussians are laying heavy contributions on the people around Beaugency, in the Department of Eure. Count de Chambord has issued a patriotic address to the Pontifical Legation, who participated in the battle at Orleans a few days ago. Through their faithful magnificence, he said the Nationals and Mobiles merited equal praise.

The commander of the fifteenth corps has made an official report to the government of the battle of Orleans. He says the fighting was desperate. The Prussians literally overwhelmed us for three hours, but, however, the enemy was broken and driven back. A dispatch from Marseilles states that Gambetta's manifesto was well received there, and that the government is fully sustained, and the Prussians are being driven from their positions. Tours, October 14.—The ministry publish the announcement, from Marseilles, that a decree of M. Esquirol suspends the law of the 10th until further orders, as a measure of public safety. Causin, son-in-law of General Garibaldi, has arrived here. Esquirol has received a petition demanding that the bishop resign, and be replaced by one chosen from the clergy of Marseilles. Esquirol desires that the congregation of the Sisters of Mercy be dissolved. The fathers will be expelled within three days, but they will be conducted to the frontier. Their properties will be sequestrated provisionally.

Nothing received to-day from Orleans or Paris. A dispatch from the sub-Prefect of Pont-Evraque, dated the 13th, contains the report of the battle of Orleans. He had burned five villages which had given shelter to the Prussians, dislodged the enemy from their second position, and cut to pieces four regiments of cavalry and several battalions. General Canrobert has also made a successful sortie on the left bank of the Moselle.

Tours, October 14.—It is reported that Keraty left Paris in a balloon and landed in safety on the day of his departure. A decree has been issued suppressing the Prefecture of Police. The Danish Minister arrived here from Paris. As soon as the bombardment of the capital commences all the representatives of foreign powers will be expelled. The amount of the balloon "Louis Blanc," which arrived here this morning, reports the Prussians, lately at Ville Annelin, now moving toward Chateaudun, where the National Guards will receive them. Advances from Metz show that the Prussians occupy a cordon of villages around the city, but in a position to obtain the distance of twenty kilometers of the fortifications. Bazaine made a sortie Saturday, in which he captured 600 oxen and 500 sheep from the enemy. The Prussians maintain a strong garrison in Nancy.

Gambetta works constantly with the military chiefs. His first object being the organization of the National Guards, and secondly, he will object to political matters. No particulars as to the cause of this success, when our dispatch left, but a dispatch was also received from Paris, stating that the Prussians, upon this unexpected event, is indistinguishable. The sailing of McLagan arrived at Shields to-day. She was obliged to throw overboard nearly the whole of her cargo, consisting of chemicals, on account of a fire breaking out on board. Operations in foreign exchange were limited, the sales of sterling embracing about \$15,000, of which \$2500 clear at 121 1/4 @ 121 3/4, \$1000 at 121 3/4, and \$5000 at 121 1/4. Sterling may be quoted at 121 1/4 @ 121 3/4 for good to All bill of lading and clear, and 122 1/4 @ 122 3/4 for bank.

Domestic exchange continued without any notable variation. The banks still drew on New York at 1/4 per cent discount, and the sales included \$10,000 commercial and \$15,000 private bankers' sight on New York at 7-16 discount, and \$5000 and \$20,000 commercial at 1/4.
