WHEREAS Representatives to fill vacancies in the Forty-first Congress and Representatives to the Forty-second Congress are to be chosen in this State on MONDAY, the seventh day of November next, as provided by law, as follows, to wit:

One Representative to the Forty-second Congress, and one Representative to the Forty-first Congress, from the First Congressional District, composed of all that portion of the parish of Orleans, on the right bank of the Mississippi river, and so much of said parish on the left bank of said river, as is below and east of Canal street, in the city of New Orleans, comprising the First, Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, Eighth and Ninth Representative Districts of the parish of Orleans, and the parishes of St. Bernard, Plaquemines, St. Tammany, Washington, St. Helena, Livingston and Tangipahoa.

One Representative to the Forty-second Congress, and one Representative to the Forty-first Congress, from the Second Congressional District, composed of all that portion of the parish of Orleans on the left bank of the Mississippi river above and west of Canal street, in the city of New Orleans, comprising the First, Second, Third and Tenth Representative Districts, of the parish of Orleans, and the parishes of St. Charles, St. John the Baptist, St. James, Lafourcade and Terrebonne.

One Representative to the Forty-second Congress, and one Representative to the Forty-first Congress, from the Third Congressional District, composed of the parishes of St. Mary, St. Martin, Assumption, Ascension, Vermilion, Calcasieu, Lafayette, St. Landry, Iberville, East Feliciana, East Baton Rouge, West Baton Rouge, Iberia and Cameron.

One Representative to the Forty-second Congress, and one Representative to the Forty-first Congress, from the Fourth Congressional District, composed of the parishes of West Feliciana, Pointe Coupee, Avoyelles, Rapides, Sabine, Natchitoches, DeSoto, Calcasieu, Bossier, Winn and Grant.

One Representative to the Forty-second Congress, and one Representative to the Forty-first Congress, from the Fifth Congressional District, composed of the parishes of Calcasieu, Bienville, Jackson, Iberville, Morehouse, Terrebonne, Bossier, Franklin, Tensas, Catahoula, Concordia and Richland.

One Senator from the district composed of the First, Second and Third Representative Districts of New Orleans.

One Senator from the district composed of the Fourth, Fifth and Sixth Representative Districts of New Orleans.

One Senator from the district composed of the Seventh, Eighth and Ninth Representative Districts of New Orleans and the parish of St. Bernard.

One Senator from the district composed of the Tenth Representative District of New Orleans.

One Senator from the district composed of that portion of the parish of Orleans lying on the right bank of the Mississippi river, and the parishes of Plaquemines.

One Senator from the district composed of the parishes of Jefferson, St. Charles and St. John the Baptist.

One Senator from the district composed of the parishes of Assumption, Lafourcade and Terrebonne.

One Senator from the district composed of the parishes of Calcasieu, Bienville and Claiborne.

One Senator from the district composed of the parishes of DeSoto, Natchitoches and Sabine.

One Senator from the district composed of the parishes of Catahoula and Winn, to serve the unexpired term occasioned by the death of Hon. J. D. Beane.
