Local Intelligence.

FIRST DISTRICT COURT.—The trial of Toole, the two Millers, and others, for beating and robbing a steamboatman named Henry Williams, in a yard on Barrocks street, about the middle of last month, was set for yesterday, but was continued at the request of the defence for absence of witnesses.

TEMPEST IN A PAINT POT.—Thomas Murphy becoming indignant with William Nichols, not only pitched into him personally and pugnauciously, but also kicked his paint pots over and around promiscuously and maliciously.

IDENTIFIED.—James Cushman, the man who was taken to the Charity Hospital on Wednesday, suffering from injuries received at the hands of some young men, who claim that they have stopped him as a burglar, is still at the Hospital under the charge of an officer.

REGISTRATION VIOLATIONS.—Admittance was made yesterday, before Recorder Houghton, by Thomas Lynde, charging Martin Tapp, a butcher in Poydras Market, with an attempt to fraudulently register himself as a voter in the Third Ward, and with perjury.

SENT TO THE CRIMINAL COURT.—Recorder Stotes sent Joe Paul, charged with stealing goods from the store of Mrs. Gache, on Chartres street, and caught by Special Dumas in the act of disposing of the stolen goods, to the Criminal Court.

AND VICTORIA WILSON, otherwise Malvina Garribel, accused of stealing a pair of gaiters, went too.

BROUGHT TO AND PHOTOGRAPHED.—The notorious H. Petrie is in limbo again. He has evidently spent the leisure moments of his short freedom in studying the vagaries of the vagrant law, together with the opinion of the Attorney General thereon, and the decision of Recorder Castled, as shaped by that opinion, was found upon his person.

WHEN DISCOVERED NEAR THE FRENCH MARKET he was accompanied by William Peterson alias Patterson, a rather youthful, smooth-faced candidate for prison honors, and when they sighted the enemy, in the shape of an officer, they both cut and ran, but were brought to by a shot from the officer's revolver. Peterson had four skeleton keys on his person.

STRABLING AFFAIR.—A difficulty occurred between six and seven o'clock last evening at a house on Bourbon street, between Crulline, and Hospital streets, in the course of which a man named Jose Sansoni was wounded by a stillerito stab in the left side. As usual with these men, he refused to give any particulars as to who wounded him, but jealousy is supposed to be the origin of the trouble.

ARRESTED AS ACCESSORY.—J. M. Fuller was yesterday arrested on an affidavit made by Special Officer Dumas, charging him with being accessory after the fact to the Rochereau & Co. burglary. He was arraigned before Recorder Stotes, and released on bonds.

SERIOUS ACCIDENT.—While Edward Raymond, a member of the Paris Fire Company No. 13, was driving a mule in a spring wagon on Gravier street, between Carondelet and Baronne, about eight o'clock last night, the mule took fright, and upsetting the wagon threw Raymond out, his skull striking the curbstone, seriously injuring him internally, it is supposed. He was taken to his residence on Thalia street.

ROBBERY.—Ben Moore was arrested yesterday, and charged with stealing from the house of Judge Walker, a gold watch and chain, and diamond ring, valued altogether at \$400. He was remanded for further examination.

THE NINTH WARD CLUB.—A large and enthusiastic meeting was held last night at the club room, on Congress, between Craps and Love streets. General Sypher made a telling speech.

RECORDER J. A. MASCOE was called for vociferously, and, advancing to the front, announced that there was no longer a division in the Republican party, as Mr. Thomas Carey had withdrawn in favor of the regular nominee. The announcement was received with loud cheers, and the Recorder withdrew.

FLAG PRESENTATION TO THE COLETS GRAD.—The second division of the Collets Guards, who held their headquarters at the hall of the Second Ward Club, met last night at the meeting room to receive a banner from the ladies of the ward. The banner was a magnificent one—it was made of satin and embroidered in silver. It bore the inscription "Presented by a committee of ladies."

THE HANNER was received by Emili Prevost, Esq., president of the organization, and Captain William E. Davis made a speech, short in length, but eloquent and to the point. After the presentation, Miss Eliza Geddes crowned the banner with a wreath of camellias.

PROCLAMATION BY H. C. WARMOTH, Governor of the State of Louisiana.

WHEREAS, Representatives to the Forty-first Congress, and Representatives to the Forty-second Congress, are to be chosen in this State on MONDAY, the seventh day of November next, as provided by law, as follows, to-wit: One Representative to the Forty-second Congress, and one Representative to serve the unexpired term of the Forty-first Congress, from the First Congressional District, composed of that portion of the parish of Orleans, on the right bank of the Mississippi river, and so much of the parish as is bounded on the west and east by Canal street, in the city of New Orleans, comprising the First, Second, Third and Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, Eighth and Ninth Representative Districts of the parish of Orleans, and the parishes of Iberville, Plaquemine, St. Tammany, Washington, St. Helena, Livingston and Tangipahoa.

One Representative from the Second Congressional District, composed of that portion of the parish of Orleans on the left bank of the Mississippi river, and so much of the parish as is bounded on the west and east by Canal street, in the city of New Orleans, comprising the Tenth, Eleventh, Twelfth and Thirteenth Representative Districts of the parish of Orleans, and the parishes of Jefferson, St. Charles, St. John the Baptist, St. James, Lake and Terrebonne.

One Representative from the Third Congressional District, composed of the parishes of St. Mary, St. Martin, Assumption, Ascension, Vermilion, Calcasieu, Lafayette, St. Landry, Iberville, Lake and Calumet, East Baton Rouge, West Baton Rouge, Iberville and Cameron.

One Representative from the Fourth Congressional District, composed of the parishes of West Feliciana, Terrebonne, Assumption, Rapides, St. Landry, Calcasieu, Deboise, Cadeo, Bossier, Winn and Grant.

One Representative to the Forty-second Congress, and one Representative to serve the unexpired term of the Forty-first Congress, from the Fifth Congressional District, composed of the parishes of Calcasieu, Bienville, Jackson, Union, Morehouse, Carroll, Ouachita, Madison, Caldwell, Franklin, Texas, Catahoula, Concordia and Richland.

Whereas, it is necessary for an Auditor of Public Accounts to fill the place of George M. Wacklin, impeached for malfeasance in office and removed therefrom.

Whereas, it is provided by law that on the day aforesaid there shall be elected State Senators from each of the following Senatorial Districts to fill the places of those whose term of service has expired, and the names of the candidates for such offices, to-wit: One Senator from the district composed of the parishes of Assumption, Lafourcade and Terrebonne.

One Senator from the district composed of the parishes of Iberville, Plaquemine, St. Charles and St. John the Baptist.
