AN UNPROVOKED ASSAULT. One Man Killed and Another Mortally Wounded.

The particulars, as we learn them from various sources, are about these: A little after seven o'clock on Monday evening last, a party of white men, in full public view, drove in numbers to the quarters of Messrs. White & Pincus, some six miles above town, on the bayou, and asked for the flag that a negro man, named John Sparrow, had carried in the radical process that day.

Upon being informed of the killing, our Parish Coroner, Dr. J. B. Knight, immediately summoned a jury, and went up there for the purpose of investigating the matter, but could find no one who could swear to the identity of the persons who were in the house, though they knew the men who came into the yard, and who entered the cabin of John Sparrow; therefore the jury returned a verdict that the deceased came to his death from a gunshot wound, inflicted by some one to them unknown, and in consequence, so far as we know, there has been no warrants issued or any arrests made up to this time.

Every body speaks well of the man John who was killed, and says that he was rather a peace-maker among his race, than otherwise. Since the commission of the act all the negroes professing to be in this section of the country, have quit working, and some of them say they will do no more until after the election.

Since the above was written, we learn that last night (November 3), as a party numbering twelve men were returning from the residence of Messrs. White & Pincus, where they had been to calm the apprehensions of danger felt by the females of the house, three of the party, constituting the advance, were fired upon and wounded.
