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Washington International Suit.

WASHINGTON, November 25.—The case before the Supreme Court, to which the late Emperor Napoleon is a party, of which something has been said in the papers, is this: In 1867, a vessel of the French imperial navy, named the "Suffre," was captured by San Francisco, and a merchant vessel of Boston, named the "Suffre," came in collision therewith. The extent of the damage to the "Suffre" was estimated at \$1,000,000. The vessel was repaired at the docks in San Francisco, and the expenses were paid by the French government. A suit ensued, instituted by the French government against the "Suffre," in the United States Circuit Court for the Southern District of New York. The case was removed to the Supreme Court of the United States. Hon. Caleb Cushing will appear for the defendant. The case will come up for final action during the session of the Supreme Court. The case now stands under the title "Napoleon III vs. The 'Suffre'." It is probable that one of the first steps in the case, when it comes up, will be a motion to change the title of the bill.
