CRIMINAL COURT.—Vincent Simondello, the Italian who was convicted of killing R. Dinichello, was yesterday sentenced to serve a term of five years in the Penitentiary.

JO PAUL, convicted of knowingly receiving some dozen knives, forks, etc., stolen on the eighteenth of October, from the store of Mr. John Gauche, Chartres street, was sent for one year to the Penitentiary.

Mr. J. B. Carter, Superintendent of this School Division, was also present. The meeting was called to order by Hon. T. W. Conway. Mr. Glavin moved that Mr. Isabelle be elected President, and Mr. W. F. Loan, Secretary.
