MISLE FROM THE HOLIDAYS. Christmas did not have that mellowing influence on the Bulletin which such bibulous festivals generally have on the souls of the Democracy, making the faithful soft, forgiving and somewhat human in their relations to the opposition.

Discontinuing the disposition of Governor Warmoth to use his influence for good at the ensuing session of the Legislature, the Bulletin predicates its skepticism upon the action of the Governor in certain matters that are now almost beyond discussion.

It is to be hoped that the advent of General Pleasanton to the Department of Internal Revenue will not be accompanied by any such suggestion as an increase of the tax on whisky to one dollar per gallon.

The tax is reasonable, and the surveillance which has been established since Andrew Johnson's time has reconciled the manufacturers to pay the assessment. They have been handled with some severity, and this has taught them that it was cheaper to pay the tax than to be continually paying people to shut their eyes.
