Fourth Day's Session

SENATE CHAMBER

Thursday, January 5, 1871

The Senate met pursuant to adjournment.

Present: Hon. O. J. Dunn, Lieutenant Governor and President of Senate, and Messrs. Anderson, Antona, Barler, Blackman, Bowman, Burt, Campbell, Comand, Daigle, Fish, Futch, Gallip, Harris, Hewitt, Hunsaker, Ingraham, Jenks, Kelso, Lewis, Lynch, Nolan, O'Hara, Pierce, Pinckhach, Ragan, Ray, Smith, Swails, Sypher, Thomas, Thompson, Todd, Twitchell, Whitney, Wilson—35.

Mr. Fitch moved that the reading of the minutes be dispensed with, which the Senate refused.

The minutes were then partially read, when, on motion of Mr. Thompson, their further reading was dispensed with. No corrections were offered or made.

Mr. Lynch introduced a bill entitled as to establish a steam ferry across the Mississippi river, at Bayou Sara.

Mr. Ingraham gave notice that he would, at some future day, introduce a bill to be entitled an act for the relief of Charles Bienville, late Sheriff of the parish of Orleans, or his assigns.

Mr. Jenks moved that the rules be suspended for the purpose of placing the bill introduced by him on its first reading.

On a call of the yeas and nays, the rules were suspended, by the following vote:

Nays: Antona, Barber, Kelso—3.

And the bill passed its first reading.

On motion of Mr. Jenks, the constitutional rule was then suspended by a four-fifths affirmative vote, and the bill put upon its second reading for the purpose of reference.

The following notices of bills were then made:

By Mr. Fitch: Of a bill to be entitled an act to incorporate the Trenton, Farmerville and Falton Railroad Company.

By Mr. O'Hara: Of a bill to be entitled an act to amend the Lafourche, Terrebonne Drainage and Land Improvement Company in the protection of this work.

By Mr. Wilcox: Of a bill to be entitled an act to amend and readopt section first of an act entitled "an act to amend and readopt an act for the corporation and organization of works of public improvements, etc., approved September 10, 1868."

By Mr. Wilcox: Of a bill to be entitled an act to regulate the practice and dispatch of business in the district courts of the parish of Orleans.

By Mr. Pierce: Of a bill to be entitled an act to amend the laws clearly to define and enlarge certain duties and powers of the Board of Health of the State of Louisiana, and to provide for the more complete protection of life and health.

By Mr. Pierce: Of a bill to be entitled an act to provide for the inspection and designation of coal oils and illuminating oils or fluids, derived wholly or in part from coal oil or petroleum; to regulate the sale or disposition of the same; to prohibit the sale or disposition of illuminating oils or fluids dangerous to life and property; and to prescribe penalties for violation of this act.

By Mr. Pierce: Of a bill to be entitled an act to provide for the vaccination, and to protect the State from the ravages of small-pox.

By Mr. Thomas: Of a bill to be entitled an act for the relief of Norbert F. Scopin and Francois Latier, and to pay the damages due and assessed on the tenth day of May, 1870, under the provisions of an act of the Legislature, entitled "an act to provide for the making of a cut-off at Scopin's Point on Red river, approved on the fifteenth day of March, 1869."

Mr. Lynch submitted the following report on behalf of the Finance Committee of the Senate and the Committee of Ways and Means of the House:

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Louisiana.

The undersigned, on behalf of the Committee on Finance of the Senate and of the Committee on Ways and Means of the House of Representatives of the Legislature of the State of Louisiana, acting jointly in pursuance of a concurrent resolution of the Senate, adopted on the sixteenth day of March, 1870, authorizing said committee to sit after the adjournment of the Legislature for the purpose of ascertaining from the officers of the State Treasury and Auditor of Accounts the amount of bonds belonging to the redemption of the State debt, to the Free School fund, and to the Seminary fund, and to examine and certify the certificates of indebtedness known as State notes, issued under act No. 5, of 1866, the number of coupons in said offices, as well as other evidence of indebtedness that have been satisfied and paid by the State, and which are in said offices, the value of which to be destroyed, beg leave to report—

That in the performance of said duty the joint committee have examined and certified the following State indebtedness, to wit:

Includes items like 'Certificates of indebtedness known as State notes', 'Interest coupons detached from State bonds issued and paid by the State', 'Blank State bonds with interest coupons thereto attached and stamped by the State Treasury', etc.

RESOLUTIONS

The resolution, as amended, was adopted. Mr. Deveses, of De Soto, by permission, introduced the following resolution, which was read, under a suspension of the rules, and adopted.

Resolved, That a special committee of three members of this House be appointed to examine into the affairs of the New Orleans Gas Light Company for the purpose of ascertaining whether said company has complied with the conditions of its charter according to law; and that said committee have full power to examine all papers, books, notes, maps, documents and accounts connected with or belonging to said company, and to report thereon to the House on or before the first day of February next.

Mr. Weyland, of Sabine, moved a resolution of the vote whereby the resolution was adopted, and also moved to lay the motion to reconsider on the table.

Carried.

Mr. Bond, of East Feliciana, by permission, introduced the following resolution, which lies over under the rules:

Resolved, That the Judiciary Committee be instructed, when appointed, to report without delay, to this House, acts repealing the laws now known as the constabulary and militia laws, and to frame and report in lieu thereof suitable and efficient substitutes therefor.

Mr. Gortkamp, of Jefferson, by permission, introduced the following resolution, which lies over under the rules:

Resolved, That the Speaker appoint a special committee of five members to examine the affairs of the Board of Metropolitan Police, and to see if the said board has complied with the act establishing said Metropolitan Police force.
