VERSAILLES.

Sortie and French Repulse—Bombardment of Defenseless St. Denis Commenced.

Mendon Batteries Advanced—Wounded Mobiles Fired—Victory of the British.

French Made but a Bombardment Recommended with Increased Violence.

[Special to the New York World.]

VERSAILLES, January 19.—A sortie took place on the sixteenth, and, after two hours' fighting, the British and the French were repulsed. Losses heavy on both sides.

The bombardment of the defenses of St. Denis and Anberville has commenced.

The Mendon batteries have been advanced and are firing into d'Issy, together with the St. Cloud batteries, and have made a great breach in the stone wall and some of the embrasures are checked.

The British have been ordered to send the pioneers opened the second parallel toward d'Issy, and batteries have been placed there, which will soon reduce d'Issy.

The French are erecting new batteries in front of Valerien.

Bavarian, Wurttemberg and Saxon batteries bombarded the whole of last night, the northern, eastern and southeastern fronts, the former repulsed.
