OFFICIAL MORTUARY REPORT.—Dr. S. C. Russel, Secretary of the Board of Health, reports that the whole number of interments in this city for the week ending Sunday evening, at six o'clock, was 101. One died of apoplexy, 1 of asthma, 2 of bronchitis, 1 of cholera, 1 of congestion of the bowels, 2 of congestion of the brain, 1 of congestion of the lungs, 25 of consumption, 1 of diarrhoea, 1 of dropsy, 3 of epilepsy, 1 of intestinal fever, 1 of hemorrhage of the lungs, 3 of heart disease, 1 of enlargement of the heart, 1 of inflammation of the bladder, 1 of insanity, 1 of interpermeation, 1 of lumbago, 4 of infantile marasmus, 3 of old age, 1 of paralysis, 1 of pneumonia, 2 of pleuro-pneumonia, 6 stillborn. Seventeen were interred from public institutions, and seventeen on certificates of coroners.

STERN'S FERTILIZER AND BONE BLACK FACTORY.

It affords us great pleasure to clip the following, from the Franklin Banner. It will be seen that Colonel Dennett fully appreciates the great enterprise and energy of our fellow citizens, Messrs. Louis Stern & Brothers, in thus establishing here in New Orleans a manufactory of such importance. That the product of this manufactory, Stern's raw bone fertilizer and phosphates, are very valuable for enriching the poor and worn-out land of this and neighboring States, cannot for a moment be doubted, as we have seen certificates from hundreds of prominent planters and scientists who have tried them over and over again, with astonishing results. We commend the following, therefore, for perusal:

FILED ON THE FAIR GROUNDS.—A serious loss.—Four or five times within a year attempts have been made to destroy buildings on the Fair Grounds, apparently by a person who entertains no good will for the Agricultural Association. The former attempts ended in inflicting small damage, but Saturday night the incendiary succeeded in firing some of the most important buildings. Flames were first discovered in or near the spacious building devoted to machinery, and before our firemen could reach the ground, had made such progress that it was impossible to save much. The fire extended to the octagon building used for the display of fine arts. Louisiana's statue of Washington was in this house, and was totally destroyed.

THE MEN FOR THE TIMES. Last week we visited Stern's pure raw bone fertilizer and bone black factory, near the Elmwood and Pontchartrain railroads, New Orleans. This enterprise is far more important to this State than we supposed it to be. The Stern Brothers are, in this matter, setting an example to all other manufacturers of fertilizers and phosphates in this State. As an enterprise, in company with Mr. Stern, we found large piles of bones and the pits of horns in mounds, in pits, out-doors, in the buildings, everywhere, and on the sides of the whole stock of bone and fertilizer, is estimated at two thousand tons.
