PONTIFICAL MASS BY ARCHBISHOP PEREIRA.—This revered minister, Sunday, celebrated a Pontifical Mass in the St. Louis Cathedral, assisted by several other dignitaries of the Church. A sermon was delivered by Father Chalon; text: "Second chapter of Acts, eleventh verse." The mass was closed by the Archbishop pronouncing a papal benediction, which was uncommonly solemn from the fact that the venerable prelate has only recently returned from Rome, where he had been favored with attentions from Pope Pius IX. Coroner Creagh held an inquest yesterday, when his jury returned a verdict of accidental drowning.

MEETING OF THE STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Important Action on the School Question. The State Board of Education met yesterday in this city, at the office of Hon. T. W. Conway, State Superintendent, No. 166 Julia street. The members present were: Hon. T. W. Conway, president; J. B. Carter, division superintendent of the sixth division; E. S. Stoddard, division superintendent of the second division; R. K. Dioso, division superintendent of the third division, and General James McCleery, division superintendent of the fourth division.

The secretary, Mr. William Rollinson, read the minutes of the previous meeting, which were approved.

The names of members appointed on the respective school boards in the various parishes and towns of the State were presented for confirmation, and action concerning them was postponed till the next meeting.

Hon. T. W. Conway, State Superintendent, then stated to the board that there were five hundred public schools in operation in the State; that there were twelve hundred teachers employed in them; that there were fifty thousand children under instruction; that the local boards were fast erecting schoolhouses in every part of the State; that there was an increasing popular sympathy for public education in every parish and town of the State; that the objects of the provision of the constitution and those aimed at by the acts of the Legislature were being rapidly and quietly accomplished; that in less than two years more, if the school acts were not interrupted by a misguided public sentiment, upward of a hundred thousand of the commonwealth's educable youth would be under instruction in the public schools, and that the only serious drawback to the good work of education consisted in the bitter opposition of the uneducated and misguided Democrats of the State.

A committee was appointed to confer with the Board of City Administrators, the Attorney General, the State Auditor and the Governor. This committee consisted of Messrs. J. B. Carter and General James McCleery. The president of the board was added to the committee. The board, after careful examination of the opinion of the decision of the Supreme Court, considered it entirely competent for the electors of New Orleans, or any other school district of the State, to hold an election on the question of a school tax, and as to the matter of success they seemed perfectly confident that a large majority would vote on the side of the schools and popular education.

There is no doubt that the members of the State Board are in great earnest on the question of keeping up the schools already established, and creating others as fast as possible. The State Superintendent, instead of being deterred by the false accusations of a portion of the Democratic press, says that he intends to force the Democrats of Louisiana to put themselves on record for or against public schools. He declares that the crisis now existing on the school question is one eminently fitted to test the sincerity of the leaders of the Democracy, as recently expressed, in favor of the rights of the negroes of the South.
