The registered indebtedness of the parish since the war is \$28,119 28, of which an amount \$45,516 92 has been paid in and canceled by the Police Jury, leaving a balance of \$3,202 36 of outstanding registered indebtedness.

LAWS OF THE UNITED STATES.

Passed at the Third Session of the Forty-first Congress, in the City of Washington, D. C., on the 23d day of May, 1871.

GENERAL APPROPRIATIONS—No. 45.

AN ACT making appropriations for the legislative, executive and judicial expenses of the government for the year ending on the thirty-first day of September, 1871, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the following sums be, and the same are hereby appropriated, out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the service of the fiscal year ending the thirty-first day of September, 1871, and for other purposes, to-wit:
