Mr. Sargant, Commissioner of Customs, has been retired. H. A. Lockwood acts ad interim. Judge Miller, Collector of Customs at Mobile, returns home to-night. He retains his place, over which there has been a desperate struggle. In the Bowen case Judge Olin decided the New York record could be attacked; the court for fraud, second for want of jurisdiction. David N. Cooper, an expert, swore there were erasures under Chris. C. and Francis and S. B. Cushing. The witness found several other erasures, but no attempt to conceal. New York, June 1.—The members of the Cotton Exchange met to-day, and decided to close the Exchange at 2 P. M. during the summer months. The committee appointed last meeting to nominate officers for the ensuing year reported as follows: For President, John W. Earle; Treasurer, Arthur B. Graves, and a full board of managers. An opposition to the list has been put forward, with J. T. Wemmen for president, and a full board of managers. The Standard of this afternoon contains a dispatch from Versailles, announcing the resignation of Favre. Two more members of the commune, Franke and Fontaine, have been arrested. Marquis Gabias goes to Berlin on the third instant as French ambassador. The interdiction upon ingress to and egress from Paris will be removed from the third instant.
