Local Intelligence.

THE OVERFLOW.—The breaks in the Canal Stopped.—The overflow which we have been afflicted for some days past seems to be subsiding.

There seems to be an apparent rise of the water in the flooded districts in some particular places, while in others there is equally an apparent fall.

The city authorities set to work with great unanimity to prevent the damage from extending, and in no department was this zeal to alleviate distress more conspicuous than in the Department of Police.

Some idea of the damage may be gained when it is known that the water was about four feet in depth between the banks of the Old canal and the Julia street bank of the New canal.

Information was filed in the following cases: State vs. George Ritter, assault with a dangerous weapon; State vs. E. C. Bohrer, assault with a dangerous weapon on Gabriel Pichon.

DEATH OF GEORGE FRIELT, ESQ.—In the early hours of Monday morning the workmen at the crevasse in the New canal, at Hagan avenue, discerned what appeared to be a human body floating in the water.

The deceased at the time of his death was fifty-four years of age, of large build and fine appearance. A general bookkeeper in the Union Bank he had given to his duties his undivided attention.

The banks of the New canal look as if they could not much longer remain as a barrier to the water. In some places, as at Derbigny street, it appears as if a spade full of dirt taken out would let the water through into the streets.

The road known as Carrollton avenue is slightly overflowed, the water coming from the lake, while portions of the ridge, usually known as above high water, are overflowed in certain places.

The efforts of the police in the late emergency have been directed to the submerged quarter, night and day. Boats have been built, rafts put together and launched with an alacrity of spirit.
