Passed at the Third Session of the Forty-First Congress.

THE COURTS.

Eighth District Court—The Question of Public Printing.

The New Orleans Republican Printing Company has brought suit against the Mayor and Administrators of the city of New Orleans relative to the question of public printing.

The petition of the New Orleans Republican Printing Company, represented by W. R. Fish, its president, shows that they have been selected and designated by the proper authorities as the official journal and State Printer; that said selection and designation was made under and by virtue of act No. 8, approved July 1, 1868, and by virtue of sections eleven, twelve, thirteen and fourteen of said act it is made the duty of the State Printer, so designated, to publish all the advertisements of the city of New Orleans, and to print the official newspaper, under penalty of nullity; that it is made the duty of the State Printer to do all the printing for said city of New Orleans, and to print, at rates fixed in other sections of the law.

Petitioners allege that notwithstanding the foregoing provisions relating to the City Council, every department and authority of the city government to have all printing of every description done by the State Printer at fixed rates prescribed by the Mayor and the several heads of departments are constantly violating and treating with contempt said act of 1868, by causing printing to be done by other persons than the New Orleans Republican Printing Company, in direct violation of the express rights of petitioners, and to their great damage and injury.

Petitioners further allege that numerous other jobs of printing have been given out for other parties than petitioners by said Mayor and Administrators of the city of New Orleans, and in fraud of the rights of petitioners. They further show that unjustly restrained and prohibited by a writ of injunction issued by the court, they are in no way benefited with petitioners, or with the printer.

Therefore, the premises considered your petitioners pray that a writ of injunction issue against the Mayor and Administrators of the city of New Orleans, individually, and against the Common Council, prohibiting and restraining them, and each of them, from giving out to any person, other than the State Printer, any printing of any kind or description whatever for the city of New Orleans, or for any of its departments or authorities in the city government, and to cause them to do so for all such further orders and decrees in the premises as the law and the equity of the case may require, and for full and general relief.

The following is the writ of injunction issued in this case: To the Mayor, Administrators and the City Council of the city of New Orleans: You are hereby commanded, enjoined and restrained, in the name of the State of Louisiana, and of the Eighth District Court for the parish of Orleans, from giving out to any person, other than the State Printer, any printing of any kind or description whatever for the city of New Orleans, or for any of its departments or authorities in the city government.

In the matter of the master's report in the case of Mr. Clark Gaines vs. the city of New Orleans, Judge Bradley rendered judgment against defendant of \$125,000 rents and profits of the occupancy of property in the city of New Orleans, and in the bill of complaint. The court also homologated the reports against John Slidell, John Diamond, William Crippel, and others.

Mr. Caldwell has announced his intention to spend the balance of his days in this State, of which himself and wife are natives.
