Cotton Statement. New York, June 25.—The cotton movement for the week shows a continued decrease in the receipts, which this week are the smallest since the figures corresponding to the week ending June 22, 1870, on the show a falling price, and the exports are nearly double those of last week, and more than twice the shipments for the corresponding week of last year.

The total exports for the expired portion of the cotton year are 3,045,915 bales, against 2,412,187 for the same time last year. Receipts from all ports are 22,174,000 bales, and 26,402 three weeks since. The total receipts since September are 3,869,044 bales, against 2,813,253 for the corresponding period of the previous year. The exports from all ports are 38,914 bales, against 19,888 last year.

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LAW OF THE UNITED STATES. Passed at the Third Session of the Thirty-first Congress. First Congress.

AN ACT making appropriations for sundry civil expenses of the government for the fiscal year ending June thirty, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, and for other purposes. [GENERAL STATUTES, No. 46.]

SEC. 1. That the sum of \$1,000,000 be, and the same are hereby appropriated, for the objects hereinafter expressed, for the fiscal year ending the thirtieth day of June, eighteen hundred and seventy-two, viz:

For defraying the expenses of defending claims under the convention with Mexico of July four, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, to be expended under the direction of the Attorney General, twenty thousand dollars.

For the compensation and expenses of the commission for determining the pending questions between the United States and Spain, in accordance with the provisions of an act entitled "An act to aid in the construction of telegraph lines, and to secure the government the use of the same for postal, military, and other purposes," approved July twenty-four, eighteen hundred and sixty-six.

For construction of revenue vessels in accordance with recommendation of the Special Commissioner of the Treasury, two hundred thousand dollars.

For furniture and repairs of furniture for public buildings under the control of the Treasury Department, one hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

For fuel, lights, and water for public buildings under the control of the Treasury Department, two hundred thousand dollars.

For heating apparatus for public buildings under the control of the Treasury Department, fifty thousand dollars.

For painting, engraving and printing plans of public buildings under control of the Treasury Department, ten thousand dollars.

For pay of custodians and janitors for the public buildings under the control of the Treasury Department, two hundred thousand dollars.

For repairs and preservation of all public buildings under the control of the Treasury Department, two hundred thousand dollars.

To enable the Secretary of the Treasury to pay for repairs of government buildings in San Francisco, California, under the department of internal revenue service in the years eighteen hundred and sixty-six and eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, the same being in lieu of rent authorized to be paid for the occupancy of said buildings, and so paid during the occupancy of said building, seven hundred and eighty-one dollars and eighty-eight cents.

For printing and engraving for the act of printing of Montana, the amount due to Messrs. Wilkinson and Roman, six hundred and forty-one dollars.

For the collection of statistics of mines and mining, to be laid before Congress, to be expended under the direction of the Secretary of the Treasury, ten thousand dollars.

For compensation of clerks and for additional compensation to same in the office of the Secretary of the Treasury, twenty-two thousand five hundred dollars.

For facilitating communication between the Atlantic and Pacific States by electric telegraph, forty thousand dollars.

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REPAIRS AND PRESERVATION OF ARSENAL, BARRACKS, QUARTERS, WORKSHOPS, STABLES, AND INCLOSURES, TWO HUNDRED DOLLARS. For Saint Louis arsenal, Saint Louis, Missouri: Officers' quarters, eight thousand dollars; reserve reservation, eighteen thousand dollars. For San Antonio arsenal, San Antonio, Texas: Erecting a store building for stores, wagon house, and store house, three thousand dollars; repairs of officers' quarters, office and painting fences, roofs and gutters of public buildings, two thousand five hundred dollars. For Vancouver arsenal, Washington Territory: Repairs to public buildings and grounds, one thousand dollars. For Washington arsenal, Washington, District of Columbia: Improving magazine grounds, two thousand dollars. For Watervliet arsenal, West Troy, New York: Repairs to buildings, roofs and permanent sheds, three thousand dollars; pairs to bridge, and fences and inclosing walls, one thousand dollars. For Watertown arsenal, Watertown, Massachusetts: Repairs of buildings, grounds and machinery, five thousand dollars. For Fort Mifflin arsenal, Fort Mifflin, Pennsylvania: Repairs of buildings, and to meet such repairs of buildings as are necessary, ten thousand dollars. BUREAU OF REVENUE AND CUSTOMS. For collection and payment of bounty, prize money, and other legitimate claims of colored soldiers and sailors, viz: For salaries of agents and clerks; rents of offices, fuel, and lights; stationery and printing; mileage and repairs; mileage and transportation of officers and agents; telegraphing and postage, eighty-seven thousand five hundred dollars. For repairs of President's Hospital and Asylum, Washington, District of Columbia, viz: Pay of medical officers and attendants; medicines, medical supplies, and rational; clothing; rent of trade room; repairs of ambulances, and transportation of patients; seventy-eight thousand dollars: Provided, That no part of said appropriation shall be used in the support of, or to pay any of the arrears of, any pensioner of the military hospital and asylum, unless persons removed thither from some other government hospital. SIGNAL OFFICE. For manufacture, purchase, or repair meteorological and other necessary instruments; for telegraphing reports; for expenses of storm signals announcing probable approach of storms; for trade room; for expenses of charts; for hire, furniture, and expense of offices maintained for public use in cities or posts receiving reports; for maps and bulletins, to be displayed in chambers of commerce, and in other places; for printing books and stationery, and for incidental expenses not otherwise provided for, one hundred and two thousand four hundred and fifty-one dollars: Provided, That no part of the several departments of the government shall be expended for telegraphing between said departments and their officers or agents, except in cases where the expense is necessary for the proper execution under section two of act of June two and thirty, eighteen hundred and sixty-six. MISCELLANEOUS. For contingencies of the army, ready. For expenses of raising, cleaning, painting, and supplying of wicks, glass chimneys, chains, spindles, and other necessities, two hundred and seventy-five thousand dollars. For repairs and incidental expenses in refitting, refitting, and improving fog-signals and buildings connected therewith, thirty thousand dollars. For expenses of visiting and inspecting light-houses, aids to navigation, two thousand dollars.
