MADHOUSE INQUIRIES. Horrible Disclosures—Ten Years in a Slave Bastile—A Herald Commissioner's Visit to the New Orleans Insane Asylum—One Hundred and Fifty Maniacs in Fifty-two Dark Cells.

The duties of a Herald correspondent, which frequently conduct to strange places, not long since led the presser into the Parish Prison at New Orleans, to witness the hanging of a couple of hired braves, who for twelve dollars had murdered a Spanish sailor.

Waiting yesterday upon the city physician, Dr. J. C. Cooper, in whose medical charge the madhouse is, and explaining to him the object of the visit, I was courteously and promptly met by an officer on the part of the doctor of his buggy and his company to the asylum.

Another iron-barred gate being unlocked, we came suddenly into the courtyard of the building, sixty feet by fifty wide, paved with granite flag stones, between which the moisture of the earth oozed in slaty paths.

On the women's side of the institute we found just the same sickening scenes, and, if possible, worse were disclosed. There were the same stench, the same filth, the same obscenity like some filthy ghoul engaged in obscene rites.

There is but one female nurse to the public asylum, and she is a night nurse. She is a woman of middle age, and she is in charge of one night watchman.
