THE COURTS. Eighth District Court—The Metropolitan Warrant Case Continued Indefinitely—The Mandamus in the Geddes Case Made Peremptory.

Considerable interest was manifested yesterday in the Eighth District Court in the case of the Board of Metropolitan Police Commissioners vs. the city of New Orleans. Unhappily, however, for those who are peculiarly interested in the case by consent of counsel, was restricted to a hearing.

In the case of William M. Geddes vs. the State Auditor, praying for a writ of mandamus to compel the issuance of warrants on the Treasurer's account, the general fund to take up certificates of indebtedness held by the State Auditor, Judge Dibble has ordered the writ to be made peremptory. The answer of the Auditor set up in this case was that they had been issued, and he also says that they were not included in his last report made to the Legislature; therefore they should not be paid.

ARTICLE I. The name and title of the company shall be THE HIBERNIA INSURANCE COMPANY OF NEW ORLEANS, and its corporate name shall be the City of New Orleans. It shall continue and exist for twenty-five years from the date of organization.

ARTICLE II. The objects and purposes of the company are hereby declared to be— Section 1. To make insurances upon dwelling houses, stores, stocks, bonds, and every other kind of property, household furniture, goods, wares, and merchandise, and other property against loss or damage by fire.

ARTICLE III. All the corporate powers of the company shall be exercised by the board of directors, who shall be elected by the stockholders at the first meeting of the company after the date of its organization.

ARTICLE IV. The capital stock of this company is hereby divided into five thousand shares of one hundred dollars each, subject to be increased to one hundred thousand dollars under this charter, and it is hereby authorized to commence business as soon as the capital stock shall be paid in full.

ARTICLE V. The election of directors shall be held on the first Monday of May of each year at the office of the company, or at such other place as shall be determined by the board of directors.

Moore, Jr., Patrick Irwin, Thomas Fitzwilliam, Thomas Gilmore, Michael McQuaid, Thomas C. Walsh, James J. Gibbons, John Henderson, Jr., William Conway, R. Briggs, Thomas McKenna, William Hart, Nicholas Burke, John M. Lockhart, Thomas Ryan, Michael Duffy.

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
