REGULAR MEETING.

The Council met in regular session at noon.

Mayor Benj. F. Flinders presided, and there were present Administrators H. Bonzano (Assessments), John S. Walton (Finance), James Lewis (Police), F. C. Remick (Improvements), L. T. Delassie (Public Buildings), Alfred Shaw (Accounts), and John Cockrem (Improvements).

The Mayor called the attention of Administrators to the fact that no monthly reports, as required by the charter, had been presented for some time, and requested that in future these reports be presented at the first meeting in each month.

Mr. Shaw asked if the Administrator of Assessments had any explanation to give why he had not presented a monthly report for some time.

Mr. Bonzano replied that he had nothing of interest to report. The new assessment was nearly completed, and the tax bills would be ready for exposure in a few days.

Mr. Cockrem presented his monthly report as follows:

The expenses of the department have been increased about \$40,000 by the overflow of June 3, leaving the ordinary expenditure for the month at about \$37,000.

By the first half of the month the attention of the department was given almost exclusively to stopping the breaks in the canal levees. Of course a very large amount was required for this purpose, and very valuable assistance was rendered by the Fire Department, the bell-boat (Osage), and the pumps of Messrs. Lewis & Knight.

By constantly working night and day the break at Hagan avenue was stopped, and the water pumped out of the overflowed portion of the city in a comparatively short space of time.

Every effort was made by this department to remedy the damage done by the overflowed portion by the construction of new bridges and fences in place of those which had been washed away, and by the end of the month the damage had been repaired. An extra force of carpenters and supply of lumber was necessary for this purpose.

During the time that attention was being solely devoted to overflow matters, the streets of the city were necessarily neglected, but later extra gangs were employed, and before the end of the month the streets were in good average repair.

During the month somewhat extensive repairs were made to the Dublin avenue drainage machine, at an expense of about \$300.

Mr. Shaw called up the jury warrant ordinance of Mr. McMurdo, which was referred to the Mayor, with power.

By Mr. Shaw: An ordinance providing for the redemption of Metropolitan Police warrants now outstanding, and to defray the current police expenses.

Sec. 1. Be it ordained, by the Council of the city of New Orleans, That the sum of fifty thousand dollars be appropriated and paid by the Administrator of Finance, and warranted for by the Administrator of Public Accounts, to take up the Metropolitan Police warrants of the year 1870-71, issued for the parish of Orleans, now outstanding.

Sec. 2. Be it further ordained, etc., That the sum of \$2,407 68 be appropriated in like manner in settlement of accounts upon pay rolls of the Metropolitan Police Board for the month of June, 1871.

Sec. 3. Be it further ordained, etc., That the Mayor and Administrator of Finance be authorized to redeem outstanding blue warrants issued for the parish of Orleans, against which no objection exists on the ground of fraud, duplication or any other illegality, by the issue of certificates under ordinance No. 882.

By Mr. Shaw: An ordinance providing for the payment of the several accounts and pay rolls therein named.

Be it ordained, That the following appropriations be and are hereby made for the month of July, 1871, and that the Administrator of Public Accounts warrant on the Administrator of Finance in payment of the same:

Total, \$1285 00. Officers, clerks and employes in the Department of Waterworks and Public Buildings, \$383 30.

Monthly Reports. The Mayor called the attention of Administrators to the fact that no monthly reports, as required by the charter, had been presented for some time, and requested that in future these reports be presented at the first meeting in each month.

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Mr. Cockrem answered that the property of the company was subject to taxation.

Mr. Bonzano said railroads through thinly populated districts like this could not afford to pay a bonus, but they were a great accommodation to the people.

The ordinance was unanimously passed.

By Mr. Bonzano: DEPARTMENT OF ASSESSMENTS, July 25, 1871. To the City Council of New Orleans.

I have the honor to report the removal of W. F. Loun, clerk in charge of the assessments of the thirteenth district (Judgers), to take office on the 1st of August, and the appointment of Michael Kernberger to fill the vacancy. I respectfully ask the Council to approve my action.

Received and approved. By Mr. Remick: DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE, July 25, 1871. To the City Council of New Orleans.

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The yeas and nays were called on the appeal from the ruling of the Chair.

For sustaining the decision of the Chair: Administrators Delassie, Lewis and Walton—3. Against: Administrators Cockrem, Shaw, Remick and Bonzano—4.

The decision of the Chair was not sustained.

Mr. Cockrem: I call for the adoption of the proceeding.

Mr. Walton: Are there any charges against these officers?

Mr. Lewis: I shall vote no because there are no charges made nor reasons assigned for the removal of these officers, and by the charter they are placed under the control of the Department of Police. I am unwilling to remove these or any other officers without solid grounds.

Mr. Walton: I vote no for the same reason.

Mr. Bonzano: I vote yeo on the ground that the Governor can reappoint them if he thinks proper.

Yeas: Cockrem, Shaw, Delassie, Remick, Bonzano—5. Nays: Lewis, Walton—2. The "proceeding" was adopted.

The Council then adjourned.
