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SARATOGA. What the New York Riot Has Done—The Presidential Death of Hoffman—The Viaduct Railroad Swindle—Gambling in Saratoga—Our Southern Horse Longfellow—Fashion and Fun—A New Spring.

CONGRESS HALL, July 24, 1871. The few letters which I have written for the REPUBLICAN have been so widely copied throughout the North, that I find myself pressed on all sides to write letters nearer home.

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THE GULF PORTS OF TEXAS. Their Condition and Capacity. The St. Louis Republican furnishes the following extracts from a letter to Mr. L. N. Reavis, from Mr. J. C. Kay, a resident of St. Louis.

BRENTHAM, Texas, July 17, 1871. Your request last winter that I write you such information in regard to the Gulf coast as I might obtain at my leisure, is hereby complied with. I find that it will not do to believe half that is told you by those who are interested in the Gulf coast.

THE TRUTH IS NONE OF THE TEXAS HARBOURS were a place on the map. There is not water enough to admit of a float or a full-laden river steamer. Galveston island is surrounded by shoals in every direction, and there is no possible chance to improve permanently the depth of water.

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BY TELEGRAPH. OUR NEW YORK DISPATCHES. CASEY'S LONG BRANCH VISIT. WHAT ITS OBJECTS WERE. DEMOCRATS PRAISE CASEY. GOVERNOR WARMOTH INDORSED. (Special to the New Orleans Republican.)

NEW YORK, July 29. It is reported that Collector Casey's visit to Long Branch was mainly for the purpose of securing the President's consent to the appointments to positions in the New Orleans Customhouse of special officers, to influence the election of delegates to the Republican State Convention in August, with the understanding that the appointees shall be discharged after the convention adjourns.

Prominent politicians now here express the opinion that if the Customhouse ring succeeds in Louisiana, the Democrats will carry the State.

Dispatches in to-day's papers say that Governor Warmoth is indorsed by New Orleans and the Republican party there.

OUR SHREVEPORT DISPATCHES. CADDO PARISH CONVENTION. Election of Delegates. State Administration Indorsed. (Special to the New Orleans Republican.)

SHREVEPORT, La., July 28.—The Republican Parish Convention yesterday morning elected Hon. Moses Sterrett and Rev. Samuel Ornistead delegates to the Republican State Convention.
