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REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION.

The Convention met yesterday at 12 M., pursuant to adjournment, P. B. S. Pinchback in the chair.

The roll was called, and one hundred and nine members answered to their names.

The committee on credentials reported in favor of the admission of John W. Waggoner, from Webster parish.

The Rev. Mr. Olmstead offered up a prayer. The reading of the minutes was dispensed with.

The Congressional committee then made a report, and recommended the appointment of the following:

First District Central Committee—H. J. Campbell and M. Mahoney. Congressional Committee—Octavo Hey, S. C. Conroy, E. V. LeClere, W. J. Moore and George Butler.

Second District Central Committee—A. E. Barber and J. E. Belden. Congressional Committee—Thomas Isabelle, F. Harp, O. F. Hunsacker, W. G. McConnell and William Murrell.

Third District Central Committee—Thomas H. Noland and George Washington. Congressional Committee—E. Bentley, L. E. Laboure, Pierre Landry, C. H. Renick and J. R. Gallup.

Fourth District Central Committee—E. W. Dewees and Raphael Blunt. Congressional Committee—M. P. Blackstone, Moses Stern, George Y. Kelso, H. S. Weldon and S. Olmstead.

Fifth District Central Committee—A. W. Faulkner and A. B. Harris. The Congressional Committee, Senator A. B. Harris stated, would remain the same as last year, as they were well satisfied with them and did not desire to make any change.

The committee for each district was then separately put to the vote, and they were all adopted.

T. A. Cope, of Terrebonne, offered the following resolution, which was adopted: Resolved, That each of the delegates to this convention be requested, when they return to their parishes and people, that they reiterate their protest against the attempt to break up the Republican party; and that they denounce any and all men who try to make discussion in our ranks.

Judge Dibble, chairman of the committee on resolutions, reported and recommended the adoption of the following resolutions: Resolved, That we declare the Republican Party to be a party of the people, and we endorse the platform of principles laid down by the Chicago Convention.

Resolved, That we believe that if honest and fairly executed, these statutes will conduce to the prosperity of the South and to the strengthening of republican institutions.

Resolved, That we especially endorse those planks in the Republican platform which pledge our party to the faithful payment of the public debt.

Resolved, That we advocate the reduction of national taxation, and a redistribution of the impost in such a manner as to impose the least possible burden upon the people.

Resolved, That we pledge ourselves and our party to the faithful execution of the constitutional and statutory provisions for the public education of all the children of the State, without distinction.

Resolved, That we insist upon the enforcement of the constitutional and legal guarantees of the civil and political rights of all men, without distinction of race, color or previous condition.

Resolved, That we endorse the Republican administration of the national and State governments. We especially endorse and commend the official career of our governor, Henry C. Warmoth, and his cabinet.

Resolved, That we advocate a policy of reasonable and wise appropriations by the State to internal improvements. We call upon the national Congress to give to the South its full quota of aid and assistance.

Resolved, That we denounce the outrageous acts of the federal officials connected with the late State Central Committee, for having attempted to pack this convention with their chosen adherents, against the expressed will of the people.

Resolved, That we denounce the original capital of the company has been subscribed in full, and that as soon as ten per cent upon it shall have been collected, work will be commenced.

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Common honesty requires a censure of the scandal created by Collector Casey and Marshal Packard in surrendering the whole Customhouse building for private use.

The house of radicalism in the State is divided, and federal bayonets were invoked to support one section or faction of wrongdoers against the other.

Upon motion, duly seconded, the resolutions and address were unanimously adopted.

The committee on resolutions reported in favor of the adoption of the following resolution offered by General F. J. Herron, last evening:

Resolved, That Senator J. H. West be requested to introduce a resolution at the next session of Congress, calling upon President Grant and other officers of the government, for all the information in their possession regarding the use of the United States Customhouse in New Orleans.

Resolved, That we, the members of the Republican State Convention, hereby recognize the Parish Committee of the Parish of Orleans, of which Hon. H. C. Dibble is president, and Joseph P. Murphy and J. D. O'Connell are members.
