Local Intelligence.

ANOTHER INVESTIGATION IN THE MAYOR'S PARLOR.—Alleged Brutality in the Workhouse.—There was another informal inquiry in the Mayor's parlor yesterday, all the Administrators present. A poor woman, named and decrepit, had made statements that she had been brutally treated by Mr. M. Bowen, warden of the Workhouse. Yesterday she was taken to the City Hall, in order that she might make her statements. Her story in substance is about as follows:

In the year 1861 her husband, William Sullivan, a policeman, was killed on Canal street by Robert Ducaus. A few days after his death a woman ruined her left eye, and from that time until today her life has been one of misery and misfortune. About three months ago she was sent to the Workhouse as a vagrant. Soon after her entrance Mr. Bowen placed her in charge of the wardrobe and wash department, with certain orders not to give out a single piece without instructions. Two months ago some of the prisoners stepped into her room, and said that the captain had told them to take their clothing, but she refused them until they pressed her, when she gave out the pieces. Captain Bowen, on hearing of it, struck her with a stick, and kicked and beat her severely. After that she was disabled that Dr. Avila, on making an examination, concluded that it was best for her to be sent to the Charity Hospital. She started, but went to her former home, No. 18 Barracks street, where Mr. Bowen learned she was. When he had her returned to the Workhouse to serve out her unexpired term. She is still suffering from bruises, and is almost unable to walk.

This is her story as reported to the administrators, and they were evidently inclined to believe it, for an order was immediately issued suspending Mr. Bowen from duty. Mr. Bowen was not present during the investigation, although he must have been aware that some kind of an investigation was in progress, as he saw the woman, Jane Sullivan, in Administrator Lewis's office, just previous to the investigation, and the administrators supposed that he was still in the hall, but after waiting nearly half an hour, and failing to find him, the case was opened.

Mr. Patrick Buckley was placed in charge of the Workhouse temporarily. Mr. Bowen, last evening, denied the woman's assertion concerning brutal treatment, but admits that he tapped her with a cane when she disobeyed his orders about the clothing. He further asserts that this proceeding was commenced against him because of the active part he took in exposing the House of Refuge brutalities. Mrs. Sullivan says several persons witnessed the beating, which, if true, will give the Grand Jury one more opportunity to make an exposure.

When the miserable woman was about to be sent back to the Workhouse she begged that she might go to the Parish Prison instead, choosing one meal a day in the latter place to a bountiful supply in the Workhouse. She was assured that no one would maltreat her now.

This extreme politeness on the part of entire strangers overcame John's natural timidity, and he ventured into the den. It did not cost him a dime to enter, but he paid every cent to get out, and then ungraciously had them arrested as thieves.

Slattery on the banquettes in front of No. 10 Rampart street, badly injured about his head as if by a blunt instrument. The first known of him was that a cab stopped in front of Ann Brown's door, the driver refusing to carry him further. He was sent to the Charity Hospital, but an inquiry soon after did not find him there. There appears to be some mystery surrounding this case.

THE CITY PARK.—The Picayune of last evening says: A committee from the Citizens' Association waited on Mayor Flanders this morning to inquire what course the city intended to pursue in reference to the purchase of the City Park by the Commissioners for the sum of \$800,000. The Mayor informed the committee that the city could not under the law do nothing but pay for the money collected for a park fund by the commissioners. It is probable the association will take steps to enjoin the city from paying that money to the commissioners until an investigation can be had into the nature of the purchase, etc.

RAID ON A GAMBLING HOUSE.—Why Was It?—Thursday night Sergeant Kelly, fifth precinct, skipped over many evils and sores between Elysian Fields street and the United States Barracks, and captured a house where a banking game was in progress. French Jack was there, also one of his relations; Captain Duncan, eighth police precinct, was there, and several butchers. The sergeant arrested the gamblers, but did not arrest Captain Duncan, the acknowledged proprietor of the establishment. Dry bones rattled around pretty lively for a few minutes when the police "approached," and a few hundred dollars in currency tumbled down.

THE CASE WAS BEFORE RECORDER LECLERE YESTERDAY, and Captain Duncan's name appeared in the affidavit, when he was arrested.

THE QUESTION ARISES, why did not Sergeant Kelly, with his corporal's guard, pounce down on other gambling houses, which are known to be running between Elysian Fields street and the barracks? Why skip over open places and raid a house located near the parish lines? It may be all right, but forcible questions will crowd in. Captain Duncan is not inclined to hide the fact that he is proprietor of the house, but insists that he will run his place as long as other establishments are permitted to operate. Perhaps this arrest will lead to some important developments.

A PRECIOUS PAIR OF ROGUES, William Brothers and Billy Boyd, alias Ackerman, alias Jew Jake, convicted of stealing four bracelets from Mr. Schmitz, No. 61 Royal street, were up on a motion for arrest of judgment. The verdict is signed by one Louis Hartmann, which was a notorious and open forgery, the man being no juror at all; therefore there is no verdict against the prisoners. The motion of arrest of judgment was granted. A new information has already being filed by the District Attorney in the case.

BILLY ADAMS, alias Jo Higgins, who was with the boy Higgins, when he committed the burglary at No. 15 St. Charles street, of which Higgins was acquitted, was up for sentence. Adams stated that Higgins, who has been before the court several times on similar charges, had given him the goods to take care of them for him. He was sent to the Penitentiary for two years.

MR. ARTHUR GASTMEL asked for time to file a motion for a new trial in the case of William Perez, convicted of picking the pocket of a Mr. Riard, on the eighteenth of June, at the Papal celebration. Time was granted.

DISMISSED.—Mr. Schwind has been dismissed from his position in the Boys' House of Refuge. Administrator Lewis doubtless took this action in consequence of the numerous exposures of brutality in the Refuge.

BAILED.—Mr. R. M. Pasteur, recently arrested for complicity with the Boyd brothers in the killing of Mr. Rainey, was yesterday released on bonds in ten thousand dollars. This action was based on an opinion given by the Attorney General. Mr. Pasteur found no trouble in procuring bondsmen.
