TESTIMONIAL TO CAPTAIN GEORGE CROSBY.—Presentation of a Gold Watch and Chain.—Yesterday evening at four o'clock, quite a number of business men, connected with the Western trade, including merchants, clerks and brokers, assembled at the Commercial Pavilion, on the levee, at the head of Lafayette street, for the purpose of presenting a testimonial to Captain George Crosby, late wharfinger of the First District.

Among the gentlemen present, we noticed Mr. C. W. Washburn, of Washburn & Sears; Julius Varian, of S. H. Kennedy & Co.; Mr. Glover, of Glover & Odendahl; H. C. Lawler, of D. Montgomery, of J. C. Murphy & Co.; Charles H. Hick, Captain J. H. Hanna, P. J. Cull, Alexander Portiano and H. Bonzano, Administrator of Assessments.

The testimonial was a superb gold watch and chain, and was presented by Mr. C. W. Washburn in a neat speech, in which he spoke of the high estimation in which Captain Crosby was held by the business men who received and shipped freight on the levee; of the impartial manner in which the duties of the position had been performed, and the general satisfaction the retiring officer had given.

Captain Crosby received the magnificent gift with beaming grace and dignity, and made a brief speech in which he stated that it had always been his aim to nete-out impartially the Government as absent from the partiality justifying in the line of his duty. He was pleased to know that his official conduct had met the approval of the business community, and in conclusion, said he accepted the gift with pleasure.

After the presentation the party partook of some liquid refreshments in the rear of the Pavilion, contained in a score or so of bottles, which, when opened, made a noise like an explosion from the muzzle of a pistol. The contents of these bottles came out with a hissing sound and frothed over the tops of the glasses as if boiling hot; yet, notwithstanding this, the company partook of the beverage with a pleased expression, showing that the drink was not unpleasant.

The watch and chain cost three hundred and fifty dollars, and was made in Geneva. The watch was purchased of Lilienthal, on Canal street, and the chain of A. B. Griswold.

Inside the case is engraved, in German text, the words: "From the Western business men of New Orleans to George Crosby wharfinger, September 1, 1871."

The numerous friends of Captain Crosby will be glad to know that since his resignation of the post of wharfinger he has been appointed, by the City Council, superintendent of wharves. He will, therefore, not be separated from his business associates, but will keep his headquarters at the Commercial Pavilion, as heretofore.

It was the testimony of the gentlemen present on this occasion, that Captain Crosby is the first wharfinger, for twenty years, who has given so much satisfaction.

WENT TOO FAR.—It is related of a fire-fighter who was recently launched into matrimony, that after indulging in a festive treat at Carrollton, he returned to town on a late car, both eyes in deep mourning—at least they were of little use to the owner.

Arriving at Canal street, he felt safe in taking the first down car that passed by, intending to go home, not very far from Bayou Bridge. Unfortunately, he stepped into a car for the Barracks, and no sooner in than he found relief in sleep, feeling safe, for the driver would wake him on reaching the end of his route. Of course the car went on to Poland street, where our friend was asked if he intended stopping or going on. With a confused mind he looked about him and discovered that he had not reached Esplanade street, so he said he would go on. Changing cars, he was soon at the Barracks, and again punched by a surly driver, who invited him to arise and go to a very warm locality. Without as much as a car ticket, the last car gone, he was in a regular fix. There was no alternative but to walk, not less than three miles, to his home near Bayou Bridge.

After thinking over the situation, he concluded to raise an alarm of fire, thus bringing cabs, machines and people, but he couldn't find an alarm box. With an aching head and weak knees he started, reaching home just in time to see the first car starting out for a day's work. Since that time our victim refrains from visiting either Carrollton or the Barracks.

SCORE OPEN.—Corporal Sullivan last night in his rounds found the store of E. J. Hart & Co. open, and a key in the iron safe door. He secured the place and deposited the safe key in the first precinct station-house. There was a fine opening for a thief, but for the vigilance of the officer, who should be rewarded for his faithful-ness, the cry of where was the police in this instance is easily answered.

TEMPORARY ABSENCE OF THE GOVERNOR.—We reproduce an editorial article from the Bee of Friday, discussing the question of the temporary absence of Governor Warmoth from the State. The conclusion is arrived at that the absence of the Governor when he goes to a watering-place to sleep, or even to tarry for a day or two at a place which is only three hours ride from New Orleans, with daily communication by rail or steamer, is not such absence as was contemplated when provision was made that the Lieutenant Governor shall assume the functions of the chief executive of the State.

The illustration of the relative distance and time occupied between New Orleans and Shreveport, and the distance and time between New Orleans and Pass Christian, is extremely appropriate. No sensible man can imagine it was ever contemplated that the Governor should notify the Lieutenant Governor of his proposed absence from the State when he rides out of the city to enjoy the sea breezes of a night or a day's advantage of a seashore resort, after the manner of many of our business men, bank presidents and others who avail themselves of the accommodations for speedy travel to occupy a seashore residence during the sultry months of summer. They have a home at the seashore while presenting their daily business in the city, and so may the Governor of the State. This is the article from the Bee:

A somewhat acrimonious correspondence between Governor Warmoth and Lieutenant Governor Dunn has been made public. The power of the Governor, the authority of the Governor that he had, during the absence of the latter from the State, pardoned one Harry Hews, confined in the Penitentiary for one year, under sentence of the First District Court of Orleans parish.

The Governor, in reply, administers a severe rebuke to Mr. Dunn for what he terms "unnecessary interference with the Governor's duties." The Governor questions the regard him as absent from the State simply because he may be beyond its limits a few miles for the purpose of recreation. The governor contends that he is within a few hours' ride of the city, and in constant communication with the clerks in his office, he is constructively present within the State. Mr. Warmoth tells Mr. Dunn that "common modesty and self-respect should have deterred him from meddling with the Governor's business and intruding upon his administration; that the Secretary of State would be instructed to refuse recognition of acts done by the acting Governor, unless official notice of the intended absence of the Governor from the State had previously been given by him, and that the convict Hews would be pardoned."

To this communication Mr. Dunn rejoins in language more sharp than respectful. He tells the Governor that his rebuke is "simply a piece of gratuitous impertinence;" that he does not recognize the authority of the Governor to interpret the laws for him or instruct him in his duty; that the Governor should always have notified him (Dunn) of his intended absence from the State, and that if he should neglect to do so, (the man pardoned,) he would subject himself to a rebuke from the sovereign people of Louisiana.

In conclusion, Mr. Dunn announces to the Governor that he "declines accepting his Excellency as an exemplar in either modesty, propriety or official duty."

Here is open war between these distinguished functionaries. After such language there is no room for accommodation. Neither can yield to the other. We take no interest in the controversy, except in so far as the people are concerned. The Lieutenant Governor is a man of high standing in the State. He has been badly advised, and the best thing he can do is to refrain in future from intermeddling with the business of the executive. The mere fact that Governor Warmoth may be for a few hours or days at Pass Christian, a place which is only three hours ride from New Orleans, with daily railroad and steamboat communication, does not justify any one in recording the Governor as absent from the State in contemplation of law, although actually beyond its limits.
