WASHINGTON.

Full Cabinet Present—State Tax on Tonnage.

WASHINGTON, October 30.—All the members of the cabinet are present; the session to-morrow will be a full one.

The Supreme Court to-day decided the case of Coe et al. versus Lott, in error to the Supreme Court of Alabama, the case being a levy by Lott, a local collector, on the boats of plaintiff in error, under an act of the State Legislature providing a tax on boats of navigable waters of the State of one dollar per ton on the registered tonnage thereof. The decision was that the State might levy a tax in another form upon the boats of navigable waters of the State, but that the judgment of the court below is reversed and the case remanded.

In the Supreme Court, to-day, the following decision was made: No. 69, the State of Louisiana versus Handlin, in error to the Supreme Court of Louisiana. Error from the Supreme Court of Louisiana. In this case Wickliffe, State Auditor, refused to pay the relator his office as Judge of the Third District Court of New Orleans, after his removal from office, and this proceeding was the result. The relator was appointed by Military Governor Sherman, and removed by Governor Hahn, who was subsequently elected under a provisional form of government, and was also appointed military governor by the President. Handlin contested the right to remove, and the court below affirmed it.

This court now says, in substance, that the appointment of the relator was purely military, and was subject to revocation whenever the judgment of the military governor, revocation should become necessary or expedient.

The adoption of a constitution and the election of Hahn during the war did not affect the military occupation of the State by the national authorities, for Hahn was appointed military governor by the President.

The situation was not changed; Hahn had the same right to remove that his predecessor had, and if the situation was changed, another civil constitution of the State was in full operation, independent of military control. Handlin, in consequence of necessity, and Governor Hahn had what ever right the constitution gave to enforce the vacancy by removal, and to fill it by a new appointment. Chief Justice Chase delivered the opinion.

In the National Life Insurance convention a draft of a general insurance law was adopted. The bill was appointed to adjust a tax of mortality for ages under ten years, not already provided for.

The mail manufacturers of the Atlantic States have decided to advance prices fifteen per cent in consequence of the loss of 10,000 kegs by the Chicago fire.

NEW YORK.

Examination of Forty Prisoners for Debt—Markets Dull—Governments Inactive.

NEW YORK, October 30.—Forty prisoners, confined for debt in Ludlow street jail, were taken before Judge Barnard, of the Supreme Court, this morning, to have their cases examined. Charles J. Hays, of the City of New York, and William Johnson, a colored man, were discharged. The remainder of the prisoners were directed to prepare statements of their assets on Thursday next, for submission to the court.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Sale of Illinois State Law Books—Fever in Alabama.

CHICAGO, October 30.—The Legislature passed a joint resolution authorizing the Secretary of War to prepare a list of the law books stored in the basement of the State House, preparatory to offering them for sale to the lawyers of Chicago.

The Tribune appeals to the generous in behalf of the sufferer, Wisconsin, Michigan and Minnesota. It is probable that 50,000 persons in Northern Wisconsin and Minnesota have been stripped of every possession. Many have been rendered blind or crippled by the order, which necessarily make them objects of charity for some time to come. Unfortunately where whole communities were involved in common ruin, there are no neighbors or relatives on whom, as in Chicago, some of the sufferers can fall back for assistance.

CINCINNATI, October 30.—Andrew Sterner, a farmer, living six miles east of Dupont, was confronted in his own home, on Saturday night, by a robber, who presented a revolver at Sterner, which he knocked from the robber's hand and stabbed him to death. The coroner's jury returned a verdict of a journeyman to leave his former employers. The damaged grain in four of the elevators, quantity not stated, was sold to-day for \$200.

ATLANTA, Ga., October 30.—Governor Bullock of this State, resigned his office, to take effect to-day, and at three o'clock P. M., Benjamin Hahn, of the City of the Senate, was installed as Governor.

Bullock's resignation was written before his flight to New York. Great excitement prevailed.
