Full Cabinet-General Sherman for Europe—No Change in Savannah Collection—How to Handle New Bonds—Military Departments—Change of Commanders—Straw Bidding for Southern Mail Contracts.

WASHINGTON, October 31.—There was a full cabinet to-day. Mr. P. Forbes, pension agent at Philadelphia, charged with \$25,000 default, has been suspended.

General Sherman leaves Boston next week for a six months' European visit. There are assurances that Colonel J. G. Stokes, of Alabama, will be appointed consul to Rio Janeiro.

The postoffice department was engaged to-day concerning bids for uncompleted mail contracts. The routes include West Virginia, three; Virginia, eleven; North Carolina, two; Georgia, four; Florida, two; Alabama, two; Kentucky, Mississippi, two; Arkansas, fifty; Louisiana, twelve; Texas, forty-six.

There are good assurances that no change will be made in the Savannah customhouse, notwithstanding the efforts made for Collector Robb's removal.

Ku-Klux arrests were considered in the cabinet to-day. Applications for bail were referred to the attorney general, he having exclusive control.

New geographical boundaries and a change of commanders of military departments is pending, and causes excitement in the military circles.

It has transpired that there has been some bidding for Southern mail contracts opened to-day, and the attorney general's opinion compels the Postmaster General to award the contracts to the lowest bidder.

WASHINGTON, October 31.—The correspondence between the government and the government officials in Utah indicates determination to crush out polygamy.
