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THE LADIES' FAIR.

The ladies' fair, inaugurated on Monday

evening, was continued last evening at Me-

sonic Hall for the purchase of an organ for

St. John the Baptist church on Dryades

street. The decorations of the hall were of

the most brilliant description, and a glance

around at the assembled ornaments showed

a scene of beauty unrivaled, save by the

gardens of the gorgeous East.

On the left hand entrance was a dainty

arch, spanning a table presided over by

Mrs. Delany and Mrs. McCormick, Miss

Cadix, Miss Nellie Quinlan, Miss McCor-

mick and Miss Gallagher.

In the centre of the arch was a large

cross, denoting that the fair attendants

were members of the holy Catholic Church.

At the foot of the cross was a four-leaved

shamrock—a thing very rare in plants of

that description.

On the table was displayed a Catholic

Bible, bound in morocco, gilt, and richly

embossed. It was presented by Mr. Go-

garty, of Camp street.

On the same table was a silver tea set

presented by Mr. Zimmerman, corner of

Canal and Camp streets, and a water-

Reception of General Hugh J. Campbell

by the Sixth Ward Republicans.

The Republicans of this ward assembled

last night in large numbers at their club

Franciscan Penitents.

Last February Congress passed an act

granting pensions to surviving officers and

soldiers of the war of 1812 who served six

days or more in said war. Under this act

there could be no claim for pension for less

than six days of service. In some cases the

have been filed by men who did not serve
