Mixed Schools in District of Columbia—Resolution by Senator West—Exemption from Cotton Ties from Duty—Conditional Adjustment in May—Relief of Purchasers of Lands sold for Taxes—Proposed Change of Time for Choosing Electors—Resumption of Specie Payments.

WASHINGTON, December 12.—Senate.—Mr. Sumner introduced a bill for mixed schools in the District of Columbia.

Resolved. That the committee on finance be requested to inquire into the expediency of exempting from the payment of customs duties all materials, including iron ties, imported into the United States, which are used for the purpose of baling or bagging cotton.

Mr. Morton's motion to adjourn sine die the third Monday in May was amended with the proviso that no adjournment take place until the supplemental civil rights bill, reduction of tariff and civil service bills pass.

The House went into committee of the whole on the appropriation bill. No action. House adjourned.

House.—The committee on expenditures were directed to examine into the financial condition of all the departments.

Mr. Barnwell's postoffice bill passed. The bill for the relief of purchasers of lands sold for taxes in the revolutionary States passed. The bill to pay the interest due to the United States on the bonds of the State of Louisiana passed.

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NEW YORK.

Ocean National Bank Failed—Cotton Houses Failed—Excitement in the Cotton Market—Seven Years' Sentence of an Abolitionist.

NEW YORK, December 12.—The Ocean National Bank was thrown out by the clearing house today. William M. Tweed was arrested on a charge of embezzlement.

The failure of the cotton firms of William P. Wright & Co. and John Leavcraft is announced. An unauthenticated rumor prevails that the Union Square National Bank has suspended.

Evening.—Money closed very light; 7 per cent gold offered; 1 1/2% commission on gold; 10 1/2% on silver. Governments rather heavy; five-twentieths of 1862, 10 1/2% Tennessee 6 1/2%, new 6 1/2%; Virginia 61, new 50; Louisiana 61, new 50; Alabama 81, new 75; South Carolina 48, new 31 1/2. Sterling weak at 9 1/2.

Arrived out: St. Patrick, Benefactor, Huntsville, Champion, Perel and Georgia. Much excitement prevails in the cotton market this afternoon, in consequence of the failure of several houses and the rumored insolvency of many others.

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FOREIGN.

Telegraphers Strike—Continues—Royal Yachts Sent out on a Cruise—Regular Troops in Cuban Forfeiture—Municipal Successes in Spain—Arrival from New Orleans—Allocation of Crowns Jewels to France.

NEW YORK, December 12.—The telegraphers' strike continues. The people are beginning to complain. The royal yacht Victoria and Albert has been dispatched to bring Princess Victoria, wife of the German Prince Imperial, to England.

Lord Chief Justice Sir Alexander Cockburn has gone to Geneva to attend the preliminary meeting of the board of arbitrators appointed to settle the controversy between the British and French governments.

The British government proposed to discontinue the strike of the telegraphers at the first meeting of the board of arbitrators. The business to be transacted is in formal view; the ratification of the powers of arbitrators.

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
