James Doyle, for malicious mischief, striking a male and thereby causing a boy to be thrown.

DEPARTMENT OF POLICE.—During the month of November the Boys' House of Refuge manufactured 11,350 pounds of bread, consuming therefor forty-two barrels and a half of flour, and distributed the same among the officers and inmates of the Asylum, Home of Aged and Infirm, Workhouse, and Girls' and Boys' Houses of Refuge. The total average number of inmates in the above institutions was three hundred and eighty, and the consumption of bread by each per day was seventeen and one-fifth ounces. Estimating the bread at six cents per pound, the month's baking was worth \$675.36. The flour cost \$446.20, netting a profit of \$229.16.

HOW HE LOST HIS MONEY.—A few days ago Mr. Bullen, a dealer in live stock, came down from Baton Rouge, where he had disposed of some animals. In payment he took a check of a bank in this city. This was for over six hundred dollars. He placed this convenient document in an account book. Arriving here he staid at his usual abode, afterward selling out. In settling his feed accounts he and his friend went in a saloon on Baronne street. He placed the precious book on a table

carelessly, and, when called away suddenly, forgot to take it with him. One of those barnacles that frequent coffeehouses saw the book and snatched it, disappearing without attracting attention. Bullen missed his book, but remembered where he left it. Proceeding to the bank he informed a clerk of his loss, giving his name and amount of check.

The man who had taken it, it was the name of J. W. Jones, is a sly fellow, and not too good to do a bad action. Calling on a Camp street grocer that has some acquaintance with him, he asked the gentleman to go to the bank with him and identify him. This was done, and the cashier accepted the identification, instantly paying the money. Jones, with so much wealth, didn't linger long in respectable places. Off he went to the head of Girod street, and thanks to the vile whiskey of that neighborhood, lost his senses. He spent money freely—so freely that Officer Riely considered something wrong, and took him in. At the stationhouse Captain Schreiber knew he had the man that several persons were searching for diligently. All the money except \$140 was found in his drunken pockets, and is now safe for the owner. Mr. Bullen will take especial pains and delight in remaining here to prosecute Jones of the sticky fingers.
