Revenues of the Country.

In a speech in the House of Representatives on the eighth instant, Mr. Dawes, of Massachusetts, said, after speaking at length on the postoffice appropriation bill: The revenues of the country are derived from four sources, which are stated in the report of the Secretary of the Treasury.

The Secretary of the Treasury, taking last year and so much of the present year which has passed, estimates the amount to be received from customs for the purpose of defraying the public expenses at \$121,000,000. The House of Representatives has stricken from that, by taking the duty of salt and coal, which amounts to \$1,709,845, making in all \$121,000,000, which will reduce the receipts from customs to \$119,290,155.
